DENIES THE CHARGE

DOCTOR ARRESTED FOR SERIOUS OFFENCE

A Young Woman is Now in the General Hospital and in a Serious Condition—She Belongs to Orillia.

Toronto, June 22.—Arrested last night, upon a warrant issued before Magistrate Kingsford, Dr. B. E. Hawke, 21 Wellesley street, appeared in the police court, this morning, charged with performing a criminal operation on Florence Watson. The arrest was made upon information laid by the girl, who comes from Orillia, and who is now in the general hospital in a serious condition.

Miss Watson alleges the operation was performed in Dr. Hawke's office, last night, for a fee of \$25. Dr. Hawke was not represented by counsel, reserved plea or election, and asked to go to a jury. Crown Attorney Corley also asked for an adjournment.

The investigation was fixed for June 29th. The doctor, who is a well-known practitioner, and has been a member of the board of education, denies the girl's charge. The girl, he says, was in his office for a few minutes, but no operation was performed.

A home has been secured for her in the city. The older sister has also a place in a home here.

Alvin Peters' farm residence, near Bowmanville, was destroyed by fire, Tuesday night, the loss being about \$2,000. The fire started in a clothes closet in an upstairs bedroom, the cause being unknown.

At Brampton, Ont., Judge McGibbon sentenced Lou Lawrence to five years in the penitentiary for having broken into a box car at Brampton station and stealing boots consigned to the Brampton shoe factory.

MAJOR SNELGROVE HONORED.

Illinois University Made Him a Ph.D.

The Illinois university, through its faculty of letters and specimens, has just conferred the degree of Ph. D. (doctor of philosophy) upon Major H. J. Snelgrove, of Colborne, the well-known quartermaster of the 40th Northumberland regiment, now in annual training at Barriefield camp. This is not an honorary degree but the result of written examinations in question showing how Anglo-Saxon supremacy became established on this continent. Identically Fort Frontenac (Kingston) played an important part in the great scheme of French domination which almost succeeded in confining the English race to the Atlantic seaboard.
