AN AWFUL PLUNGE

RUNAWAY HORROR FOR THE PLEASURE SEEKERS.

Victims Crushed Under Overturned Cars—Lights Were Turned Out in Excitement That Followed and Work of Rescue Was Delayed.
 New York, June 23.—Carrying merry-makers at a speed of seventy miles an hour two cars on the switch-back railway known as the Rough Riders' Ride at Coney Island jumped the track early on Tuesday. Sixteen persons were hurled to the ground from a height of sixty feet, and six of the victims are dying at the Coney Island hospital. The fatally injured: Munnis Cahall, Brooklyn, N.Y.; Thomas Ericson, Brooklyn, N.Y.; Richard Raddermacher, Brooklyn, N.Y.; Rose Wilson, Brooklyn, N.Y.; Manuel de Colo, Brooklyn, N.Y.; Harry Fletcher, Los Angeles, Cal.
 All of the others of the sixteen were seriously injured.
 The Rough Riders' Ride has seven inclines running from the Bowerly to the beach. The highest of these is sixty feet and it was from this that the victims were hurled.
 Owing to the intense heat a large number of persons spent the night on the sands of Coney Island. So at the time of the accident there was a large crowd at the resort. Two cars counted together, each containing eight laughing persons, started from the first incline. They were in charge of Cyrus Pinto of Coney Island. After leaving the first incline and making a swift descent the cars shot up again to the top of the sixty foot incline and began to rush down it. At this point Pinto lost control of the brakes and could not check the speed. On the first turn the cars swung partly around the curve when the first car jumped the track and pulled the second with it.
 Ten of the passengers were hurled from the cars and planged through the mass of painted scenery and props about the inclines. They landed in the road below in an unconscious heap. The other six went down with the wreckage. These were the fatally injured.
 After the accident the place was surrounded by a screaming hysterical mob. In the excitement some one turned off all the lights of the attraction and the place was in darkness. Policemen nearby hearing the crash sent for the reserves in the Coney Island station and also put in ambulance calls.
 When Capt. Michael Galvin reached the scene of the accident he found the lights still shut off. For a time his work of rescue was delayed while a policeman looked for an electrician. When the lights flared up again the police saw the mass of wreckage and the unconscious and injured persons. The victims were quickly transferred in ambulances to the hospital. The police lifted the wrecked cars out of the way and got to those pinned beneath them.
 Pinto was taken to the police station. He declared that the accident was unavoidable. He could not explain how he alone of all those in the car had been unhurt.

DEMANDS APOLOGY
 For Attack Made Upon Roumanian Mail Boat.
 Paris, June 23.—A despatch from Athens says Roumania has delivered an ultimatum to Greece in regard to the attack on a Roumanian mail boat at Piræus, about a week ago. On that occasion a mob boarded the Roumanian boat and looted all the valuables of the passengers, among whom were a prince and princess. Roumania insists that Greece shall make an official expression of regret; shall make compensation to those injured during the looting of the vessel; shall dismiss the prefect of the port, before whom the captain of the Roumanian ship was summoned, and shall punish the guilty looters.

AN HEROIC MOTORMAN.
 Gave His Life to Save His Passengers.
 Washington, June 22.—Charles River, a street car motorman, died from the shock and burns of 7,000 volts of electricity which charged through his body when he heroically dragged a live wire away from passengers who were threatened. Two persons, probably more were saved from death by his act, when his body burst into flames as the powerful current surged to the ground. He lived through the night in agony. He leaves a wife and two-weeks-old baby.

Posed as Horseshief.
 Deadwood, S.D., June 23.—As far back as 1864, when he was a free newspaper correspondent at Carson City, Nev., Mark Twain showed the humor that afterward was to be the dominant characteristic of his life. The story of how he posed as a horse thief, and the photograph he used for that purpose, have never been published. They are in the possession of Maj. A. J. Simmons, of Deadwood, former chairman of one of the co-conspirators in the joke.
 Maj. Simmons, Clemens, and the late Judge William H. Claggett, of Deadwood, were intimate friends in Carson City in 1864, just at the time when three horse thieves were being sought by the vigilantes. Twain conceived the idea of posing as the criminals and took Simmons and Claggett to the photographers, where the trio had their pictures taken together. Twain then wrote on the back of the photograph, "Three villains recently hung by the vigilantes at Aurora, Nev." and the day after the hanging circulated the photograph in Carson City to such good effect that many who did not know the originals in the photograph took them for the hanged men.
 Citizens of Westport assembled, on Tuesday evening, to extend farewell to the pastor of the Methodist church, Rev. J. Howard Philip, M.A. An address was read and a purse of \$175 in gold was presented.

 So thought William Schroeder, a flour salesman from Milwaukee, forty years old and fat.
 A short time ago he received authoritative information from a comely widow, Mrs. Colgate MacIvor, who had a delicate countenance at 3,025 Cottage Grove avenue, that the saying is not universally true. The revelation led him into indiscretions which culminated in his appearance in the police court yesterday.
 So deeply did the love of the widow take him that he consented to accept \$5 from her.
 Later the widow realized that it was not Schroeder's personal grith that had won her affections, but the supposed extent of his possessions. When she discovered he was not a wealthy bachelor brewer, but an impoverished flour salesman with a family, she had him arrested for obtaining money on false pretences.
 Just how the love affair resulted in the transfer of the \$5 was a mystery that Municipal Judge Gemmill was not able to solve. Mrs. MacIvor said Schroeder got it from her after two days' courtship by pretending that he wanted to buy her a \$25 skirt, but had only \$20 in ready money. Schroeder said he understood the \$5 to be a gift.
 "Judge," he said, "I was foolish. I thought I loved this woman. She had one little remark she made. The first day I went to her store she said she loved fat men."
 "Yes, she told me she loved fat men, and I began to boast and make out I was wealthy. She gave me \$5 to buy myself a present. I never promised to buy her a skirt."
 "I am a flour salesman and have a family in Milwaukee. If you let me go I will pay her the money and get right home."
 Mrs. MacIvor said her large woe-stricken face with his stories of a great estate in Wisconsin, purchased from the profits of his business, was the picture of his mansion to be ever so large," she said. "He describes it as on top of a beautiful hill surrounded by a chain of lakes. We were to be married in a few weeks and get there to live. But now I will be satisfied if I get back my \$5."
