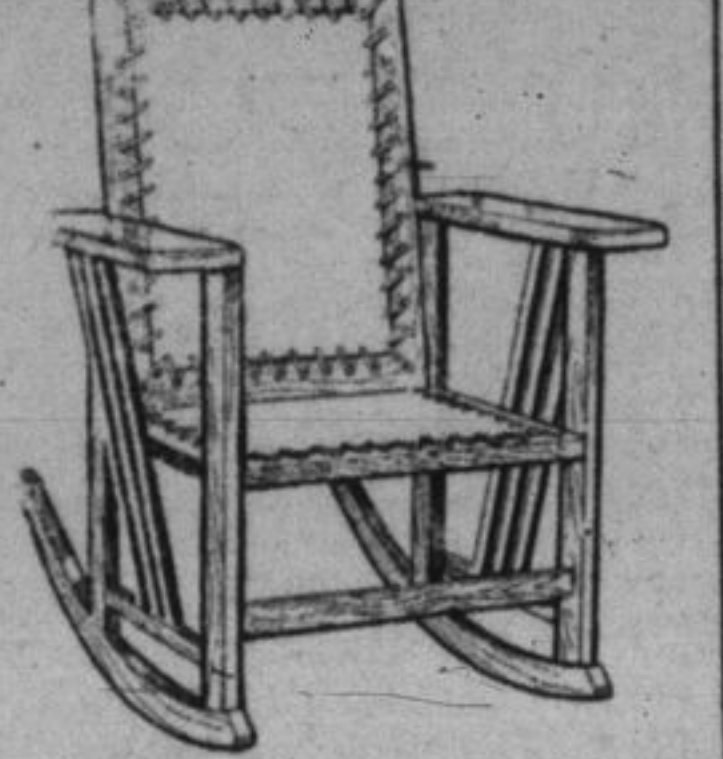

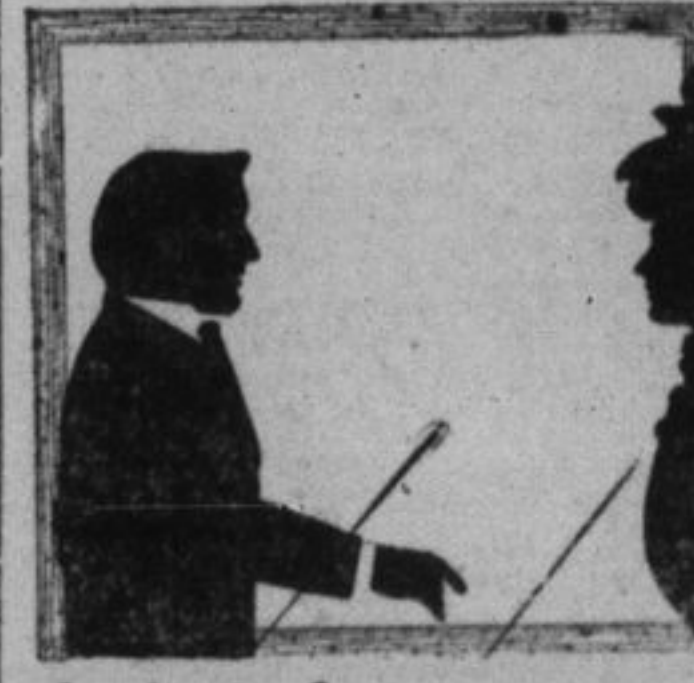
Taxes Being Paid In. Next Thursday will be the last day for receiving the discount of two per cent on the city taxes.
