Canon Grout's Work. AS RECTOR OF THE PARISH OF ELIZABETHTOWN. A Writer Tells of His Self-denying Work—Built the Handsome Stone Church at New Dublin.

Arnprior, June 23.—(To the Editor) In a recent issue of Church Life, there appeared an article which purported to be an account of the work of the parish of Elizabethtown, and of the work done there by the various rectors. The account can hardly be called a complete one, inasmuch as no mention is made of the incumbency of Rev. Canon Grout, which lasted some twenty years in that parish. When Canon Grout went there in 1881, he found the New Dublin part of the parish in anything but flourishing circumstances. While rector, Canon Grout built and paid for the handsome stone church of St. John, at New Dublin, at the cost of some \$10,000, a cut of which building appeared in The Ontario Churchman strongly labelled as "The Lyn Church."
