ARE NOT ENTITLED TO SHARE IN THE FUNDS OF THEIR TRIBE.

Because They Migrated to Canada and Were Not Enrolled on the Last Records of the Tribe Prepared in 1876.

Detroit, Mich., July 14.—A Washington dispatch says: Ottawa and Chippewa Indians, who long ago crossed the border to Canada, are not regarded by the Interior Department as United States Indians, entitled to share in the funds of their tribe. This position was asserted by the department some time ago and affirmed by Acting-Secretary Pierce, to-day, after hearing the representatives of the Canadian Indians. The Ottawa and Chippewas, who in earlier days migrated from Michigan to Walpole Island, river St. Clair, in Canadian waters, claimed they should share in the tribal funds, aggregating \$131,188 awarded those tribes by the court of claims in 1907. The department held they did not prove that they or their ancestors were enrolled in 1876, when the last records of the tribes were taken. They had probably moved out of the country before the treaty of 1855 and they had been receiving benefits from the Canadian government.

PITH OF THE NEWS.

The Very Latest Called From All Over The World.

James Doyle, a Toronto employe committed suicide.

The body of an unknown Indian was taken from the Niagara river. No agreement has yet been signed between the C.P.R. and its men.

The health of Quebec's lieutenant-governor is improving, according to the latest news.

H. C. McLeod, Toronto, was robbed on a Pullman sleeper between Toronto and Cleveland, Ohio.

Alfred Cooper, the shipping clerk arrested for stealing from Bauls Bros., leather warehouse, Toronto, pleaded guilty.

About thirty Doukubors at Verigin are preparing to go on march again. They have burned all their clothing and money.

M. Kilpatrick was sentenced to four months in jail at New Lisbon for an unprovoked assault on License Inspector Blackwell.

Walter Northrup, said to have lived in Toronto, for ten years, disappeared mysteriously from Syracuse a week after he had been married.

The trustees of the Pennsylvania railroad have voted an agreement as to wages and working conditions is reached with the company.

At Montreal, United States postage stamps valued at \$100,000 were seized by representative of federal government on suspicion that they are forgeries.

David McKinley, a Toronto bankrupt butcher, was sent for trial on a charge made by the assignee of neglecting to keep proper account books of his business.

The body of J. N. McKendry, the Toronto dry goods man, who died in London, Eng., is being brought across on the Lusitania, which reaches New York to-morrow.

Because of a wave of crime at Pittsburgh, Pa., recently the authorities have prohibited moving pictures of train robberies, safe cracking and other exciting events.

Pulpwood concessions, around Lake Nipigon, are to be sold by the provincial government subject to the condition that the wood is manufactured into paper in Ontario.

The democratic state convention of Wisconsin has voted in favor of nominating a state ticket, and unanimously named Adolph J. Schmitz as their candidate for governor.

The negotiations between Spain and the Vatican on the church question has been suspended, on account of the illness of Senor Ojeda, the Spanish ambassador at the Vatican.

The moving picture theatres of Hall Que., have decided not to show the Jeffries-Johnson fight pictures there even if they are permitted by the Quebec government.

Two more small-pox cases have been discovered in Toronto and now there are four small-pox patients in the Swiss cottage hospital, including one from the township of York.

W. G. Trethewey, owner of the farm at Weston, where the aviation meet is in progress, has made a present of five hundred dollars to Count De Lesseps in recognition of the count's splendid flight across and around Toronto last night.

D. Whitnall Bynum, alias Will Brynoff, alias Guy Cecil, pleaded guilty to assaulting and attempting to rob W. L. Gage, of Chicago in the King Edward hotel, Toronto. Bynum will be sentenced after inquiries into his antecedents.

Gen. Baden-Powell and his renowned scouts will be seen at the National Exhibition, Toronto, this season. The little fellows, in uniform, will attend from all parts of Ontario, 500 of them being camped on the grounds for the opening three days of the fair.

The York Pioneer and Historical Society has decided to send a petition to the Ontario government, asking that a lasting monument in stone or bronze shall be erected near the Parliament buildings, Toronto, on which may be placed the names of the victors won by the Canadian forces in the war of 1812, together with the names of the leaders who then fell in the defence of their country, including Brock, Tecumseh and Macdonell.

INDIAN EDUCATION.

An Endeavor to be Made to Better It.
Ottawa, July 14.—It is announced that the government is considering the question of Indian education in the west with a view of its betterment. An increase will be made in the grants to residential schools for Indians. Supt. Duncan C. Scott is leaving for the west, in this connection to-morrow.

Inspector Inflow, of the immigration department, who got into trouble with J. Taylor, of Woodstock, at Windsor, Ont., has been suspended for one month for incivility.

News has been received in Ottawa that the cottage, erected last year for Earl Grey in the Tolly Valley, Carleton county, has been destroyed by an avalanche.

The appointment of census enumerators for the Arctic regions has been given to Fabian Vanasse, the journalist, who accompanies Capt. Bernier.

AVENGED FATHER

NEW ORLEANS GIRL SHOT HIS ASSASSIN.

Italian Salsonekpeep and Grocer Killed by Man Who Demanded Money in Name of the Black Hand.

New Orleans, July 14.—Joseph Manzella, proprietor of a saloon and grocery, fell a victim of the so-called "Black Hand" society, yesterday, but his death was avenged a few seconds later when his seventeen-year-old daughter shot and killed the assassin as he was attempting to escape.

Manzella had recently received money, letters signed "Black Hand Society," and yesterday an Italian called at the store and demanded money as a representative of the society. When ordered to leave the place he shot Manzella in the breast. As Manzella fell he drew his revolver and fired, Young Joseph Manzella rushed into the store and gave chase to the assassin, firing at him as he ran.

When the police arrived the girl was bending over the body of her father, weeping. The slayer lay in the gutter near the entrance, with three bullet wounds near his heart.

The commissioners were given the power regarding the location of laundries, at a recent meeting of the council, and this is the first case of the kind to come up, since the power was given.

To Secure His Release.

Petitions are being circulated in Toronto for the release of Dr. Stephen B. Pollard, serving a five-year term in Kingston for performing an abortion. It is urged that the doctor is in a state of collapse and has already suffered enough as he is stripped of all honor in the community. He was sentenced last fall.

Rag and Bone Danger.

The medical health officer says that there are at least two places in the city where rags and bones are deposited, and which are dangerous to the city's health. He proposes having a by-law passed fixing the limits for such deposits, which should not be allowed near the habitable portions of the city.

Labor Day Sports.

The commercial league has not as yet accepted the offer of the sports committee of the Labor Day parade to play the deciding game on the holiday, but it is expected that the league will do so. The sports committee will receive a report from the league, at their meeting, which will be held on next Tuesday evening.

To Give Final Notice.

On the recommendation of the city solicitor, the board of health will give a final notice this week to those who have failed to comply with its no-pit regulation. If this notice is not obeyed within ten days after it is issued, the delinquents will be summoned before the police magistrate.

A band is reported organized in connection with the local post office. It is expected to give a concert in the Clarence street park shortly.

A FINE RECORD.

Grand Officers of the C.M.B.A. Meet in Kingston.

A meeting of the executive of the grand council of the Catholic Mutual Benefit Association of Canada was held in this city on Wednesday. The following members were present: Hon. M. F. Hackett, grand president, Stantand, Que.; J. J. Behan, grand secretary; J. E. B. Howison, assistant grand secretary; Dr. Ryan, grand superintendent medical examiner, Kingston; Geo. Lynch-Staunton, K.C., grand legal adviser, Hamilton, Ont.; Hon. Judge McHugh, Windsor; J. T. Halliday, Truro, N.S.; J. W. Mallon, L.L.B., Toronto; Dr. Alex. Germain, Montreal; and J. A. Murphy, chairman, committee on laws, Cayuga.

A number of important matters dealing with the internal work of the association were dealt with.

The report of the auditors, for the half year ending June 30th, was presented, showing in detail the standing of the various funds of the association on that date. The auditors state: "We are pleased to note the great progress made by the association during the three years since the last convention statement, June 30th, 1907. The membership of the association has increased during that time from \$228,407.43 to \$322,531.66, equal to 129 per cent. increase."

The grand secretary's report for the three years ending 30th June shows that during that time he has received \$1,123,113.15; for general fund, \$39,165.04; general fund, \$31,137.33; sick benefit fund, \$16,430.21, making a total of \$1,329,965.75. During the same period the disbursements have been: For beneficiary fund, \$1,056,135.13; for general fund, \$117,217.75; for sick benefit fund, \$11,498.01, making a total of \$1,184,773.93.

The membership on the 30th of June had reached 22,252. The total amount paid out for death claims and sick benefits is \$4,634,059.09.
