Coming Report Won't be Sweepingly Condemnatory.

Ottawa, July 19.—At the militia department it was stated this morning that no particulars as to General French's report on the Canadian militia are yet available, and as far as can be ascertained in the absence of both Sir Frederick Borden and the deputy-minister, Col. Fiset, from the city, the report has not yet been presented. It is believed, however, by those who have talked with General French after his recent inspection of the militia that he will not be likely to make his report so sweepingly condemnatory as the Canadian Associated Press cable publishes this morning would seem to indicate.

General French was on the whole very favorably impressed with the general character and progress towards practical efficiency in the field now being made by the militia of Canada.

CAUGHT IN THE ACT

YOUTHS ATTEMPTED TO ROB GROCERY STORE.

Went into store of Bernard McCarey, Ontario Street, and Ran Off With Tobacco—Police Chase Chase and Afterwards Found the Offenders in Hiding—Remanded for Sentence.

"Caught in the act." This would be a proper title for the story concerning Bernard O'Rourke and William O'Keefe, both about seventeen years of age, who were locked up by Constables Bateson and Mullinger, on Monday night, on a charge of theft. In police court, on Tuesday morning, both pleaded guilty, to the charge of theft lodged against them, and were remanded until Friday for sentence.

Bernard McCarey is the proprietor of a little grocery store at the corner of Ontario and Princess street. About seven o'clock on Monday evening, he had just finished eating his supper and was walking into the store when he noticed two young men rushing out of the store, both carrying parcels. He gave chase, and in the excitement, one of the youths dropped a parcel, which contained three plugs of chewing tobacco, and a couple of packages of smoking tobacco.

Mr. McCarey tried to catch them, but as the youthful thieves had a good start he was unable to do so. He sent a hurried call to the police, however, at the same time keeping watch on the young fellows to see where they would go.

Constables Mullinger and Bateson responded to the call, and they came up on their bicycles. They were tipped off to the boys, and were soon on their tracks. The boys ran for all they were worth, but the law soon gained on them. On Queen street the lads went into a laneway, in the rear of Abernethy's store, and when the policemen arrived they were out of sight. The constables got busy and looked around, however, and they soon found both the offenders, hiding behind some packing cases. Then they were taken to the police station.

When arraigned in the police court, both pleaded guilty. "It is pretty difficult to know just what to do with you boys," remarked the magistrate, to the two boys, both before the court on several occasions, and have been given several opportunities to make good."

The magistrate then remanded the two until Friday.

THE RAILWAY STRIKE.

The Suburban Train Not Running—Excursions Cancelled.

The strike of the G.T.R. conductors and brakemen resulted in no suburban train running out of Kingston since Monday evening. The carrying of passengers, daily and on Saturdays, will have to be done by the street cars and the cabmen. J. P. Hanley, the local agent, will arrange for the transferring of all G.T.R. passengers.

There was to have been an excursion from Port Hope to Kingston, and to the Thousand Islands this morning, but had to be cancelled. The excursion to Ste. Anne de Beaupre is also cancelled at very short notice.

The regular passenger trains were running this morning but it is not known how long this will continue.

MEN ARE STILL MISSING.

No Trace of Two Men From Wolfe Island.

No trace whatever has been found of the two Wolfe Island men, "Jack" Casey and Michael Henney, and the worst is feared. One of Mr. Casey's brothers stated to the Whig that he felt sure now that the men had been drowned. The boat found off Simcoe Island has been identified as the one the two men hired from Bowman's livery. If the men were drowned, it will be some days, of course, before the bodies will be recovered. Much regret has been expressed on all sides over the sad affair. Both young men were well known in this district, and had many friends.

REMANDED ANOTHER WEEK.

A Young Woman Who is Accused of Theft.

Birdie Smith, a young woman, arrested a week ago, on a charge of theft, and remanded, came up in the police court, again on Tuesday morning. The magistrate questioned her about this, however, but she said that she knew nothing whatever about the stolen property. The magistrate then remanded her for another week.
