Second Body Found. REMAINS OF JOHN CASEY, OF WOLFE ISLAND. Picked Up in the Harbor Last Evening—Decomposed Drowned on the Night of the 16th Along With Michael Hennessy. Also of the Island.

The body of John Casey, the companion of the late Michael Hennessy, who was drowned on Saturday night, July 16th, while crossing the harbor to Wolfe Island, in a skiff, was found, last evening, by W. Yellowley, Jr., who was out on the harbor in a gasoline launch. The body was floating out opposite the locomotive works. He towed it to Swift's wharf, where it was taken in charge by Police Constable Timmerman, and removed to the undertaking establishment of James Reid & Co., where it was prepared for burial. This morning the body was taken to Wolfe Island, where interment took place. It was expected that the body would be found in the harbor just the same as that of the late Mr. Hennessy. Both bodies were found floating in about the same place. The late John Casey was thirty-one years of age and unmarried. He lived all his life on the island. Rewards of fifty dollars were offered by each family for the recovery of the bodies.

SKINNING WNCLE SAM. Hatpins Brought in as Needles to Beat Tariff. New York, July 28.—Several million hatpins with eyes like needles are imported into the United States every year. The device is a strange bit of tariff foolishness which saves the manufacturer many thousands of dollars at the expense of Uncle Sam. It became known through a customs report just made public here. There is no tariff on imported needles, but there is a tariff on hatpins. Therefore the steel makers for hatpins are made with eyes so that technically they are needles and come in free of duty. The holes are filled with solder and heads put on after they have passed inspection.

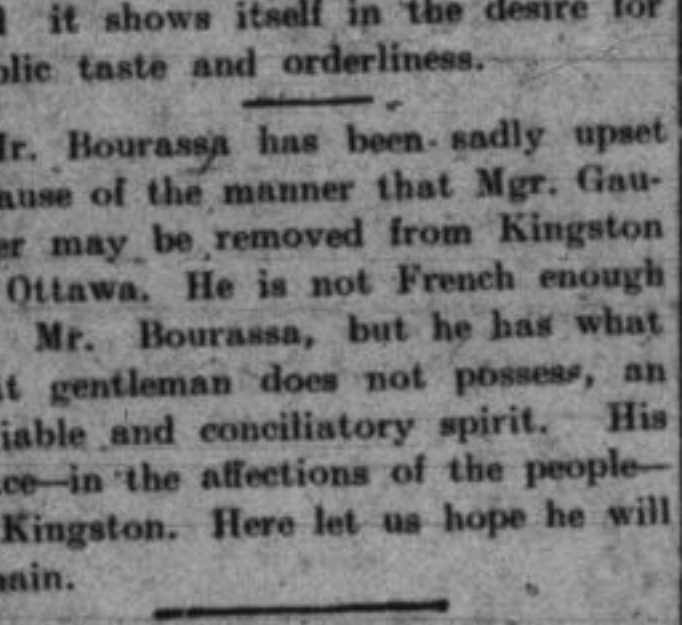
