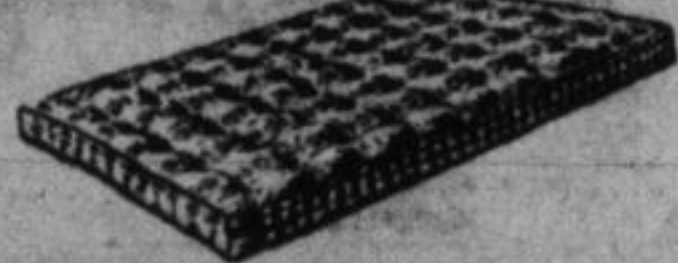

THE DEATH DICE.

In Murder Case They Returned a Just Verdict.

The German emperor, some time ago presented to the Hohenzollern museum the "death dice" with which one of his ancestors decided a difficult case in the seventeenth century. The history of these dice is generally given as follows:

A young girl had been murdered. Suspicion fell upon two young soldiers, Ralph and Alfred who were enticed for her hand. They both denied their guilt, and even torture failed to extract a confession from either.

Then Elector Frederick William decided to cut the knot by means of the dice box. The two soldiers should throw for their lives and the loser should be executed as the murderer.

The event was celebrated with great solemnity. Ralph had the first chance and threw sixes, the highest possible number. The dice box was then given to Alfred. He fell on his knees and prayed. Then he rose to his feet and threw the dice with such force that one of them was broken. The whole one showed six, the broken one also gave six on the larger portion, and the fragment split off showed one. This was a total of thirteen, one toward Ralph's throw. The audience held its breath in amazement.

"God has spoken!" cried the prince. Ralph, appalled by what he regarded as a sign from heaven, confessed his guilt and was sentenced to death. —Chicago Record-Herald.

THE WAISTCOAT.

It Became Popular by Patronage of Charles II.

Few men realize how much they are being influenced in their dress by King Charles II, and yet it is to that monarch we owe the adoption of the waistcoat as a regular article of gentleman's dress, says London M.A.P. At least that is so if we are to accept the statement of Pepys, who in his diary under date of October 16th, 1665, states: "The king has declared his resolution to set a fashion which he would never alter." and "This day King Charles II began to put on his vest. It is a very fine and handsome garment."

Prior to this date they were exceptional garments, and there is even some doubt whether they were originally worn by ladies or gentlemen, though there is good reason to believe they superseded the doublet, such as was worn by Raleigh, Essex and other notables of the Elizabethan age. A neat waistcoat "wrought in silk" is mentioned in "Patent Grissell," 1692, and there is a painting in distemper of a vest on the walls of Winchester cathedral, dated 1489, so that what Charles II took was merely an existing garment, which he re-modelled, and by his patronage so popularized it that it became a standard article of gentleman's dress.

London's Big Ben.

Harper's Weekly. Why is the large bell the tower of the house of parliament in London called Big Ben? The average Londoner himself seems to have no idea how it got its name. When the building was designed Sir Benjamin Hall had the great deal to do with carrying out the plans of the architects, being high commissioner of public works, and his co-workers appreciated the fact that in the city of London was largely indebted. So when the question came up in parliament as to the name of the tower a member shouted, "Why not call it Big Ben?" This suggestion was received with much applause as well as with roars of laughter, for Sir Benjamin was an enormous man, both in height and girth, and had often been called Big Ben. From that day on the bell whose peal every Londoner knows has been known only as Big Ben.

IN MARINE CIRCLES

THE STEAMER HECLA WAS RE-LEASED THIS MORNING.

About 300 Tons of Its Coal Cargo Had to be Taken Out—It Proceeded to Ogdensburg Towing a Barge—Movements of Vessels in the Harbor.

The steamer Hecla, of the George Hall company, Ogdensburg, N.Y., which ran ashore at Oak Point, Wolfe Island, yesterday morning, was released at five o'clock this morning by the Calvin company, which had three boats at work at the stranded vessel. About 300 tons of the Hecla's coal was lightered, and after some hard pulling the steamer was floated. It left immediately for Ogdensburg, towing the barge on which the lightered coal had been placed. It is not thought the steamer is injured. The captain was on the steamer Phoenix, when she ran into the gates of the Cornwall canal last week. Ill-luck seems to follow him.

Adjusted the Loss. John Donnelly, of the Donnelly Wrecking company, returned this morning from Ogdensburg, where he adjusted the loss on behalf of the marine insurance underwriters, caused by the steamer Phoenix, of the George Hall company, smashing two of the gates of the Cornwall canal last week. The total loss was fixed at \$12,000.

Rielieu Shows Increase. Rielieu earnings up-to-date show a gross of \$400,000 for the current season, being an advance of twenty per cent. over the corresponding period last season, when \$300,000 represented the gross total. These figures were given out after the usual weekly meeting of the board of directors.

The R. & D. business has been particularly brisk this season, travel being heavy on all lines, particularly the western tourist business. There has been an average travel on the western lines of four hundred passengers a day, while last season at this time the boats were handling an average of two hundred and fifty passengers.

M. T. Co.: Tug Emerson cleared for Oswego and Charlotte to bring across two coal barges; steamer Rosemont, and barge Metcalf, cleared for Cleveport and load coal; tug Bartlett due Saturday morning with coal barges from Lake Erie.

A SERIOUS CHARGE

Made in St. Thomas Against Belleville Institution.

St. Thomas, Ont., July 29.—The local board of health decided that there had been serious if not absolute,ly criminal neglect on the part of the authorities at the Belleville Institute for the Deaf and Dumb, which was responsible for the death of a child of one of St. Thomas' citizens. The child contracted scarlet fever from a sister who had been sent home from the institute, who was allowed to bring home her dolls, books, etc., after an outbreak of fever there.

Stage Lures Young Mother.

New York, July 29.—"I would rather carry a spear than nurse a baby." With this note as his clue, Charles Westland, a chauffeur, is, to-day, looking for his wife, who, called by the lure of the stage, left her three-year-old child with a neighbor, penned the above note to her husband, and disappeared.

A chorus girl who lived with the Westlands gave the young mother the yearning for the stage with stories of its pleasures. The husband is searching all the cheap summer resort theatres, confident that if he can find his wife he will be able to induce her to return to her home and baby.

A Big Cotton Conspiracy.

New York, July 29.—The organization of the International Cotton Mills Corporation, a combination of cotton interests with control over many of the textile mills in this country is announced by Myron C. Taylor, its president. The concern was incorporated, yesterday, under the laws of New York, with an authorized capital of \$20,000,000, and it will acquire either by direct ownership or by stock companies which handle sales and distribution in Canada as well as in this country. The products of the combined mills will represent about 3,000 varieties of cotton fabrics.

Fined \$50 and Costs.

Brookville, July 29.—At the police court, Acting Magistrate Murphy imposed a fine of \$50 and costs or two months in the common jail on Frederick Botsford and Arthur Carboneau, arrested in connection with the riot here Friday night last. The charge was reduced from one of assault to that of impeding officers in the discharge of their duty. On the fine being paid, Botsford was released, but Carboneau was detained, owing to the fact that he is wanted at Belleville for an alleged assault case at that city on Thursday night.

SYNOPSIS of Canadian North-West Land Regulations.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Priority—Six month residence upon cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within one mile of his homestead on a

farm of at least 20 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price, \$1.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price, \$2.50 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$100.00.
