LIVE STOCK MARKET

The Prices Paid at the Various Centres.

Monday, Aug. 8.—About 350 head of black & cattle, 250 calves, 715 sheep and lambs, and 600 hogs, were offered for sale at the Point St. Charles stockyards, this forenoon. Trade was fair with firm prices for good cattle, but hogs are lower. Prime beefs sold at from 6c to 6 1/2c per lb., but they were not steady. About 100 raze cattle were sold at from 4c to 4 1/2c per lb.
