"B" BATTERY HOME.

ARRIVED FROM PETAWAWA ON MONDAY MORNING.

Weather Was Fine for the Camp, and there Was Very Little Sickness—Reached Kingston Six O'Clock, and Hour Later Were Settled in Barracks.

Tanned up, and looking well, the members of "B" Battery, returned home from camp at Petawawa, on Monday morning, at six o'clock, and are once more settled in barracks. The "boys" like camp life, but they are always glad to get back to Kingston. Ask anyone of them and I will tell you so.

The men made some quick work in unloading. It was six o'clock when the contingent arrived, and one hour later they were all unloaded, with all the horses in the stable, and the guns in the shed.

Col. Burstall did not return home with the battery, he having been granted a few weeks' leave, and is taking a holiday.

All the officers report the camp to have been a splendid one. The weather was fine, with very little rain, and there was very little sickness. The only mishap whatever was the case of a driver who was thrown from his horse, but he was not seriously injured, and a few days in the hospital was sufficient to place him on his feet again.

The battery left Kingston on July 28th, having a little over a month at the camp. Upon arrival in barracks, the men were called upon to groom the horses, this part of the usual programme having to be dispensed with on account of the trip.

With both batteries now back in the city, Kingston again takes on a military air. Both batteries had a splendid outing, and everyone appears to have a good word for the camp at Petawawa. At the barracks, this morning, the men were busy getting the equipment in to the proper place. The band of the R.C.H.A. was out on the barracks square this afternoon, and gave a fine concert.

CORRIGAN'S.

ENTERED A PROTEST

AGAINST THE SUNDAY EVENING BAND CONCERT.

Rev. Dr. MacTavish Says There is Nothing Sacred About It—He Calls Upon Sabbath Observers to Protest.

In speaking in Cooke's church, on Sunday morning about the danger of running with a multitude to do evil, Rev. Dr. MacTavish made reference to the band concert which it was proposed to hold in Macdonald park in the evening.

"Why should this concert be held?" he asked. "There is nothing sacred about it. Nothing is sacred that does not honor God, and how can He be honored in the performance of this evening. He will be recognized in no way whatever. His word will not be read, His blessing will not be invoked; prayer will not be offered to Him. If one were to suggest that between the musical numbers, passages of scripture be read, or that prayers be offered, the probability is that the suggestion would be regarded as an impertinence, and the one who offered it would be looked upon as a religious fanatic."

"This is the second time, during the present summer, that arrangements have been made for a concert in the park, on Sunday evening." Dr. MacTavish said, "and it is time that those who believe in a Sabbath sanctified, and not in a Sabbath desecrated, should enter their protest against these performances."

SCOUTS THE IDEA.

Prof. Macgillivray Does Not Think Was Possible.

The Dean, in Montreal Standard. "What makes Germany formidable" is the title of an article by Professor Macgillivray in "Queen's Quarterly," a publication I never read without gaining knowledge or fresh point of view. Like Professor Horning, he sketches Germany's part, in order that his readers may understand the present situation. Apart from some unnecessary sneers at England, the article deserves careful attention. What makes Germany formidable is briefly the German respect for science, and compulsory military training, which Professor Macgillivray admires greatly. This passage is perhaps the most important, as it discusses (and scents) the possibility of war between Germany and England. "It would seem," he writes, "of course, almost incredible that a nation like Germany, a leader in civilization, in the arts and sciences as in speculative thought, a people furthermore noted for their general bonhomie, should causelessly meditate any aggression on a kindred people of equal civilization, and which has done more for the development of the world than any other." To which it may readily be objected. First, that the "nation," or the "people" is not the same thing as the "government" or the "bureaucracy" or the "directing classes." Second, that German bonhomie did not prevent Bismarck precipitating the war of '70-'71 by the Ems telegram or hinder Bismarck from attacking the French, a "people of equal civilization," for the sake of founding a new empire.

CIRCULATING A PETITION.

For the Establishment of Public Bathing Houses.

A petition is being circulated for presentation to the city council, asking that public bathing houses be established. The petition should be signed by everyone to whom it is presented. With the bathing houses, the tired working man or woman would have a chance to enjoy a good swim after a hard day's work. A great many tourists enquire for the public bath, and are very much disappointed to learn that there are none available, nearer than Lake Ontario Park. It would also encourage swimming among all classes of people.

The Late Thomas White.

Lanark Era. In the prime of life Thos. White of Calabogie passed away at his late home, on Aug. 1st. He was postmaster, and although people knew he had been ailing for some time, he still was able to attend to the duties of his office and his death coming within an hour after he had to give up work, caused a great shock to those who knew him from day to day.
