

Annapolis, formerly Port Royal, was "garrison town" from the time of anding by De Monts in 1604, until, in 1853, it ceased to be the capital of the Province of Nova Scotis and the troops were withdrawn and stationed at Halifax, and is therefor the oldest settlement in Canada.

Sir William Butler. Canada remembers Sir William tler as the author of "The Great Lone Land," a book on western Canada before railways and migrations of people were features of prairie life. Sir William died recently in the old country at the age of 72. He was one of the brilliant roll of soldiers whom eland has given to the Empire's service. Sir William was born in Tip-erary, and started soldiering at the age of 20. He served in many parts of the world, and saw much active service, in which he greatly distin-guished himself. After four years in e east, he went in 1870, with the Red River expedition in western Canda. The years 1873 and 1874 saw im in Ashanti, and the following gear he went on a special mision to Bloemfontein. In the Zulu war (1879-80) he was staff officer at the Brit sea base. In 1882 he was in Egypt, and fought at Kassassin and Tel-el-Kebir. Two years later he was selected by Gen. Wolseley to organize the Nile Expedition for the rescue of Gordon. He made a brilliant effort, and the fact that it was too late was no fault of his.
