iop, without any knowledge of the Thomson invention, patented a pneumatic tire. The safety bicycle had then come into vogue, but its wheels were shod with solid rubber tires. Mr. Dunlop's little son possessed a tri-cycle, and as the Dunlops then lived in Belfast and the Irish roads were of very bad surface this veterinary surgeon applied a rubber tube filled with compressed air, and it afforded such comfert to the rider that Mr. Dunlop brought the idea before adult cyclists, and some enthusiasm was aroused. But Mr. Dunlop would have hardly been more successful in 1888 than Thomson in 1845 had not anoth-

er man appeared on the scene.
