**THEY CHOSE A CAMP**

Newboro, Aug. 31.—A number of representatives of the Back Eye Fish Club, of Pittsburgh, Pa., were here last week, and in company with W. J. **HEROIC ENGINEER.**

Scalded in Saving Passengers, Dismisses Incident.

Pittsburg, Aug. 31.—Engineer Israel Brandt's nerve saved train No. 8, of the Fort Wayne division of the Pennsylvania railroad, with its load of sleeping passengers, from wreck in the Union station yards. A cap on a pipe, directly above the throttle, blew off, letting loose volumes of steam. The firemen jumped and escaped with slight injury, but Brandt stuck to his post with blistering hands and burning face until he had brought the train to a standstill. By that time he was nearly unconscious and fell from the cab window when the train stopped. His arm was broken in the fall and he was badly scalded. At the hospital it was said he was in no danger, and Brandt added: "There's nothing to make a fuss about."

**Record Prices in Prospect.**

Montreal, Aug. 31.—The live stock situation in the west appears to be critical at present. In fact it is the one special element of discord in the west.

Cattle dealers in Chicago were much interested in a despatch from Winnipeg which stated that beef promises to reach record prices this fall and of winter. The western ranges are very poor, and the cattlemen are finding such difficulty in feeding their stock that they are disposing of their cattle. The result is that at present Winnipeg has plenty of cattle of an inferior grade.

For the time being prices are lower, but butchers say that it will be followed by exceedingly high prices this winter, and that beef of any kind is likely to be scarce. What is disturbing the live stock men is not so much the inconvenience of a temporary shortage in beef supply as the permanent influence that such a disaster as the present entails upon future production.

**Saw Hesse's Mightiest.**

Friedberg, Hesse, Aug. 31.—Emperor Nicholas and Empress Alexandra, of Russia, arrived here safely, at 3.30 o'clock, yesterday afternoon. Their majesties were accompanied into German territory by a suite of fifty persons. Great crowds had gathered in the streets in hopes of having a view of the visitors. They were not disappointed for the emperor and empress were driven from the railway station to the castle, they will occupy while here, in an automobile. Their suite also followed in open motor cars.

**A New Stimulus.**

Chicago, Sept. 1.—A new impetus was given to the federal grand jury investigation of the beef trust with the calling of fourteen new witnesses, instead of closing the packers' case and beginning on the oleomargarine enquiry, as was planned for by the government. The change put now vigor into the beef investigations.
