LEEDS PIONEER DEAD

THOMAS FAIR WAS NINETY-FOUR YEARS OF AGE.

Gananoque, Sept. 2.—Another of the pioneer residents of Leeds township passed to rest, yesterday, in the person of Thomas Fair, aged ninety-four years, at the home of his son William Fair, twenty miles east of town. Deceased was widely known and highly esteemed throughout the township where in his earlier days he took an active part in everything that tended to advance the condition of this section. He was predeceased by his wife, some years ago, but leaves one son, William, and three daughters, Mrs. Aggie Fair, at the homestead; Mrs. Freeman Shipman, of Ivy Lea, and Mrs. Green, of Lyndhurst. The funeral will be held Sunday afternoon, at Gananoque cemetery.

A pretty wedding was solemnized on Wednesday evening, at the home of Mr. and Mrs. George Dowley, Arthur street, when his sister, Miss Myrtle Harriet Dowley, daughter of David Dowley, late of Dowley's Corners, was united in marriage to Robert Galloway, of Sweet's Corners. The ceremony was performed by Rev. Henry Gracey. The bride was the recipient of numerous handsome and costly tokens of esteem, among which being a check for \$200. Mr. and Mrs. Galloway will reside at Sweet's Corners.
