A BULL BROKE LOOSE

AND CAUSED PANIC AT THE TORONTO EXHIBITION.

Looks as Though the Attendance Would Reach the Million Mark—Carrier Pigeons Released.

Toronto, Sept. 1.—The exhibition is still keeping up its attendance increase. If this rate of increase continues the total attendance should be near the looked for goal, the million mark.

The blowing up of the Dreadnought at the lake front this afternoon is an exciting event for those who see it. It is the 2nd Fleet company of Canadian Engineers which is giving the show.

A Dreadnought, fifty feet long, is exploded by submarine mines. The boat is placed on a raft about half a mile from the shore. Nearly twenty pounds of cotton and four sticks of dynamite are used in each mine.

An event which was not on the programme, but which turned out to be most exciting, was the escape from the stables of a huge black bull. It was just at three o'clock when the animal broke away and dashed through the thick crowds at the eastern corner of the grand stand. Women screamed, children fell over themselves in fright, and a genuine panic spread through the vicinity. The bull, in the meantime, with full joy at his freedom, charged down towards the lake, past the Press Building, and into the enclosure where the cattle are judged.

The Canadian Federation of Homing Pigeon Fanciers sent out 2,400 pigeons from the grand stand.

It was a beautiful sight to see the air almost white with the wings of the birds, as they flew around the stand preparatory to their long flight to Hamilton, St. Catharines, Woodstock, Kingston, and other points. When they arrive at their destination their time will be taken and the winners announced later. Their average speed is about forty miles an hour.

California Frank and his Wild West Show, which created a furore here last year, has returned to Midway, with all his old favorites, as well as a score of new artists. In the principal cities and hippodromes of the United States, in the interval, he proved to be a banner attraction.

ADAMLESS EDEN.

A City Block Devoted to Bachelor Maids.

New York, Sept. 2.—A whole city block of women, with not a man in sight, will become an interesting reality in the "improved mode of living" in New York City early next year. Prominent New York men and women, who are keenly interested in the housing problem, say the new arrangement will offer accommodations for many hundreds of New York's business and professional women and students who represent the bachelor maid population of the city.

The members of the woman colony, which it is declared will be the only one of its kind in the world, will be housed in two separate buildings.

The buildings when completed will accommodate nearly one thousand women. The only men to be allowed on the premises will be those received socially by the young women guests. Men will be encouraged to make social calls, and provision has been made for this social feature of the club by providing a few dozen of what will be known as "bean parlors." Here young women may receive their friends and no record will be kept of the gas burned. In the new order of things, where women will live under the same unrestrained liberty as the men and women of wealthy clubs, there will be no intervening janitress, no elevator maid, no woman superintendent, or lady night watchman tip-toeing about the halls turning out the gas, as a gentleman to the young man that he had better be moving.

AN OTTAWA DREAM.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier Would Take Mr. McBride as a Successor.

United Canada. Premier Richard McBride, of British Columbia, has been offered his choice of the portfolios in the Laurier cabinet, with the right of succession to the liberal leadership also pledged to him, if he would, before the next election, abandon the conservative party.

This is the substance of a story that comes to United Canada from an authoritative source in Victoria, B.C., and is corroborated "as quite probable" by Sir Wilfrid's closest personal friends in Quebec.

After examining the political situation at close range personally in Alberta, Saskatchewan and British Columbia, and realizing its hopelessness, Sir Wilfrid has, it is said, intimated to confidential friends that the outstanding danger and threatening menace to liberalism in the west, all centres in the towering personality of Dick McBride, the brilliant young premier of British Columbia.

What can be done to delay this catastrophe, the terrified towering ministers ask themselves when they see the ex-ministers and heroes of yesterday—Tappan, Dewdney, Prior, Duff, Montague, and others—simple onlookers at the show to-day, in the west.

Well, Mr. McBride has been approached and the aforesaid offers have been made to him.

John Henry, the lumber baron, of Vancouver, the president of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, and partner of James J. Hill, is the gentleman entrusted by Sir Wilfrid Laurier as his plenipotentiary in the negotiations with Mr. McBride.

When United Canada asked the Montreal senator if he could recall a political precedent for the offer to Premier McBride, he replied, "Certainly, several," and he went on to say:

"It is no secret that Sir John Macdonald tried to capture the great Honore Mercier, about 1888, and might have succeeded were it not for the late Hon. John Henry Pope. I am told on good authority also that the old liberal government in Ontario, finding that the young men were gradually rising in revolt against it, offered to take the present premier, Whitney into a coalition government, and later offered Attorney-General Foy a supreme court judgeship."

"I may tell you," said the same gentleman, "that Sir Wilfrid is quite convinced that none of his present colleagues is fit to lead the party."

This startling story will probably be denied on all sides, but that it is founded on facts we have no doubt whatever.

Charges Against Choate.
