### APPOINTMENTS MADE TO THE VARIOUS FREE METHODIST FIELDS OF LABOR.

The Sunday Services Were Very Interesting—Address by Returned Missionary From China—Bishop Sewell Also Preached.

Sunday, Sept. 4th, marked the closing of the Free Methodist church conference which had been in session here since last Wednesday. The conference was one of the most successful in the history of the church, and was marked by several outstanding features. One was a talk given on Sunday afternoon by Rev. and Mrs. C. F. Appleton, returned missionaries from China. Mrs. Appleton was dressed in the native garb of China and the two little girls were dressed likewise. Mrs. Appleton sang several songs in the Chinese language, which were very much appreciated by the large audience present. After the sermon a call was extended to those present for funds with which to carry on the work of saving the Chinese from heathenism. A good sum was realized \$75 in cash being given over and \$136 was subscribed in a short time. On Sunday evening the church was packed to the doors to listen to Bishop W. A. Sewell, of Jamestown, N.Y., president of the conference. He delivered a very able and inspiring sermon.
