YNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON WHO IS THE SOLE ad of a family, or any male over it are old, may homestead a quarter ction of available Dominion land in mection of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alferta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by pracy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 50 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section slongside his homestead. Price. \$3.00 per acro. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emtpion may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price. \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
