THE LENNOX FAIR

WAS PRONOUNCED FIRST CLASS IN EVERY RESPECT.

A Fine Exhibit of Horses—The Fruit and Vegetables Were Also Excellent—The Usual Baby Show.

Napanee, Sept. 17.—The sixtieth annual exhibition of the Lennox Agricultural Society was held here, Thursday and Friday. There certainly was king's weather, both days being as balmy as summer time, and the throngs upon the exhibition grounds reminded one of the Canadian National exhibition at Toronto, last week. The show was never better, and in many respects excelled exhibitions of other years.

The baby show on the night of the 15th was a perfect crush, and the following sweet bundles of humanity made their proud parents happy: Dr. Ming's special prize, best baby, boy or girl, Martha Wheeler, five months old; girls, Agnes Holbrook, nine months old, first prize; Florence Clark, nine months old; second; Dorothy Hinds, five and one-half months old, third; Boys, James Whitney Skinner, first; Clifford G. Aornis, seven months old, second; Chauncey Goodall, eleven months old, third. The judges had a difficult task in selecting the winners from sixteen entries. Those who did not get the money prizes received a handsome doll.

The fruit exhibit was never so good as this year, and it was of an excellent quality, free from spots and blemishes. It was much admired, and the expert judges said they never judged anything any better.

The vegetables also were admired, and they certainly deserved to be. One squash weighed sixty-eight pounds, the seed of this was planted on June 18th. All the root exhibits were of a mammoth quality. The dairy products also were of a high order.

The following merchants displayed their wares in an attractive manner: Dufosse & Waller, a fine exhibit of sash and blinds; M. S. Madole, with his usual tasteful display of stoves and hardware, made an attractive corner in the east wing; A. E. Paul displayed notions and souvenirs in an attractive manner; C. A. Wiseman, and R. B. Allen occupied spaces, the former with the Laval separators, and the latter with bell pianos and organs and photographic apparatus. Madole also made a very elegant display of their goods, showing furs, dress goods, carpets and other furnishings; F. W. Vandusen had a tasty display of harness, robes and rugs.

The ladies' fancy work was, as usual, greatly admired, and it certainly was never better. The fine arts were also excellent, occupying one wing, thus showing to better advantage the large assortment of paintings, drawings and etchings.

The display made by the exhibitors, outside the stock line was, as usual, the best. William Branson, and M. Lohhead had a full line of short-horns, eclipsing all former years of that class, and J. C. Creighton, with his herd of Ayrshires, carried off the honors.

The exhibitors of Holsteins, Jerseys, and grades were: A. W. Caton, L. Ballance, Irvine Hamby, W. H. Cadman, W. Dawson, John Valentine and others. M. N. Empey, C. W. Neville, W. Dawson, J. P. Dawson, J. C. Creighton and others had a fine display of all kinds of sheep.

The horses, in general, were of a superior quality, and the judges were surprised to see so many fine animals and remarked that this district would be a great field for buyers of fine horses, in a few years.

Altogether the exhibition was a grand success and the directors are to be congratulated.

WHY RAISE HATS?

Motto of Society for Promotion of Greeting.

"Why raise your hat?" is the motto of the Society for the Promotion of German Modes of Greeting, whose headquarters are at Darmstadt, says the London Chronicle, it is a wasteful habit, because it wears out the hat. It is unhealthy, because in bad weather it is apt to bring on colds. And, worst of all, it is unpatriotic for the custom when adopted from the French, the first nation in Europe to have the head as a form of politeness. The true mode of greeting for Germans, we are told, is the military salute, which is of purely Teutonic origin, having originated among the officers of the Prussian Grenadiers.

The society has gained many adherents, and the inhabitants of Darmstadt are now accustomed to see elderly civilians stand rigidly to attention and bring the hand smartly to the forehead when they meet acquaintances in the street.

The mere salute, without raising the hat, will be welcomed by many of us, for when we wear the soft hat or the cloth cap we find it easy enough to pluck it off. But how to return it to its place? There is no firm—the clutch, of courtesy is stopped midway, and there is no courtesier living who can take off a golf cap and return it to his head gracefully. So let us agree not to take off our hats, but merely indicate with our hands that we would take them off if we could put them on again.
