## COUPLE QUIT

### George Primrose And Wife Separated

### WHAT GEORGE SAYS

#### WIFE OF WELL-KNOWN MINISTRETT LIVES IN NEW YORK.

Primrose Admits He and His Wife Are Separated, But Says He is Not Seeking Return of Property He Deeded to Her.

New York, Sept. 16.—Although admitting that he and his wife are living apart, George H. Primrose, the veteran minister, declared last night that his belief in the gospel of "This more blessed to give than to receive" had not been shaken, and that he had no intention of bringing legal action against Mrs. Primrose to recover the fortune in real estate he transferred to her.

When seen in his apartments, at the Hotel Lincoln, Broadway and 22nd street, Mr. Primrose said: "Yes, it is true my wife and I are living apart, and I have just returned in New York and I have just returned from a month's vacation, passed along the St. Lawrence river. Mrs. Primrose's lawyer did serve some papers on me some time ago, but I do not remember what they were."

"However," continued Mr. Primrose, "my lawyers tell me that there has been a consultation with the attorney for Mrs. Primrose and that there is a strong likelihood of a reconciliation." Mr. Primrose refused to discuss the cause of the estrangement, but said he had not been living with his wife since the latter part of July. At that time they were planning to depart for Portland, Ore., where Mr. Primrose has had erected a hangar on forty-eight acres of farm land he owns there.

According to the minister, the deeding away of real estate has become a habit with him. He built a mansion at Fulton and East Lincoln avenues, Mount Vernon, and acquired other property in the exclusive Chester Hill section of that city. So extensive were his holdings that a section of the town was named Primrose Park. Mr. Primrose said last night that he was unable to estimate the value of his holdings in Mount Vernon. He declared he had deeded the property to his wife three years after their marriage, which took place seven years ago. He said he took a similar course with his property when his first wife was alive.

"I am not shooting for my present back," said the actor. "Mrs. Primrose and I are both well protected financially." When asked what his holdings were Mr. Primrose referred to his forty-eight acre farm in Portland. Mr. Primrose, who is said to be more than sixty years old, received a fortune of \$35,000 from his first wife, who died in a tragic manner in Detroit in 1903.

Within a few months after the death of his first wife Mr. Primrose married Miss Esther Nerney, his present wife, then about twenty-six years old. Miss Nerney was a concert singer in San Francisco and exceedingly handsome. Mr. Primrose had first met Miss Nerney at a convent in Yonkers ten years before.

Real estate men say the value of the Primrose property in Mount Vernon is between \$150,000 and \$300,000. Storrington Council. Sunbury, Aug. 29.—Council met, members all present. Hanley, to examine culverts on "Bear Creek road" and repair if necessary. On motion, Hanley-Taylor, by-law No. 431 given its second and third readings and filled in with S. Jamieson as collector, four mills for township purposes, twenty mills for county, and eight mills for general school rate. By-law passed. On motion, Hanley-Taylor, the revee and treasurer were appointed to make arrangements with a chartered bank in Kingston to receive all moneys from the collector and the treasurer to pay by cheque. Council adjourned to meet again, on the last Monday in November.

### AIRSHIP INVENTION

#### GLIDER FLOATS IN MELLER—AS 5.33. HORIZONTAL POSITION.

#### Effective Tests Made—Glider Dropped From 1,000 Metres, Flouted 12 Miles Before Touching the Ground.

Rome, Sept. 17.—Fernando Bernasconi, a native of Ascoli Piceno, has invented a peculiar aeroplane, or glider which is able to float in mid-air, and which assumes a horizontal position automatically. The inventor has built models six feet wide, which, when dropped from a height, instead of falling heavily to the ground, almost overcome the law of gravity and travel a great distance in the air before descending slowly to the ground.

According to recent experiments, a glider dropped from a height of 1,000 metres floated twelve miles before touching the ground. This scheme, if applied to aeroplanes, the inventor claims, will render falls impossible, and will increase the speed of the aeroplane, as the motor will not be required to overcome the resistance of the air.

### CORONATION FLAGS.

#### At Least \$2,500,000 Worth to be Flown.

London, Sept. 17.—The makers of flags, bunting and street decorations are working overtime in view of the coronation, though it will not take place until next June.

"It is quite a conservative estimate to say that at least \$2,500,000 worth of flags and other emblems will be shown in the London streets the day King George is crowned," said the London manager of a large firm of flag-makers, who supply the wholesale houses. "And of that value," he said, "at least \$1,000,000 will represent brand new flags."

"Our mills in Manchester are already working overtime, for the wholesale firms are placing their orders now, so that they may not be left and in order that they may obtain the goods at normal prices. Already we have in store immense quantities of flags which have been bought and paid for. There is every indication that the most popular flag will be the naval ensign. King George is known as the 'King Admiral.'"

"Union Jacks are more than holding their own, but vast quantities of colonial flags has been ordered, Canadian, Australian, New Zealand, Cape Colony, Transvaal and Natal flags are being heavily ordered. It is necessary for the wholesale houses to buy their flags early, for the number of trained lace-making hands in the country is limited. They are nothing like a thousand in number."

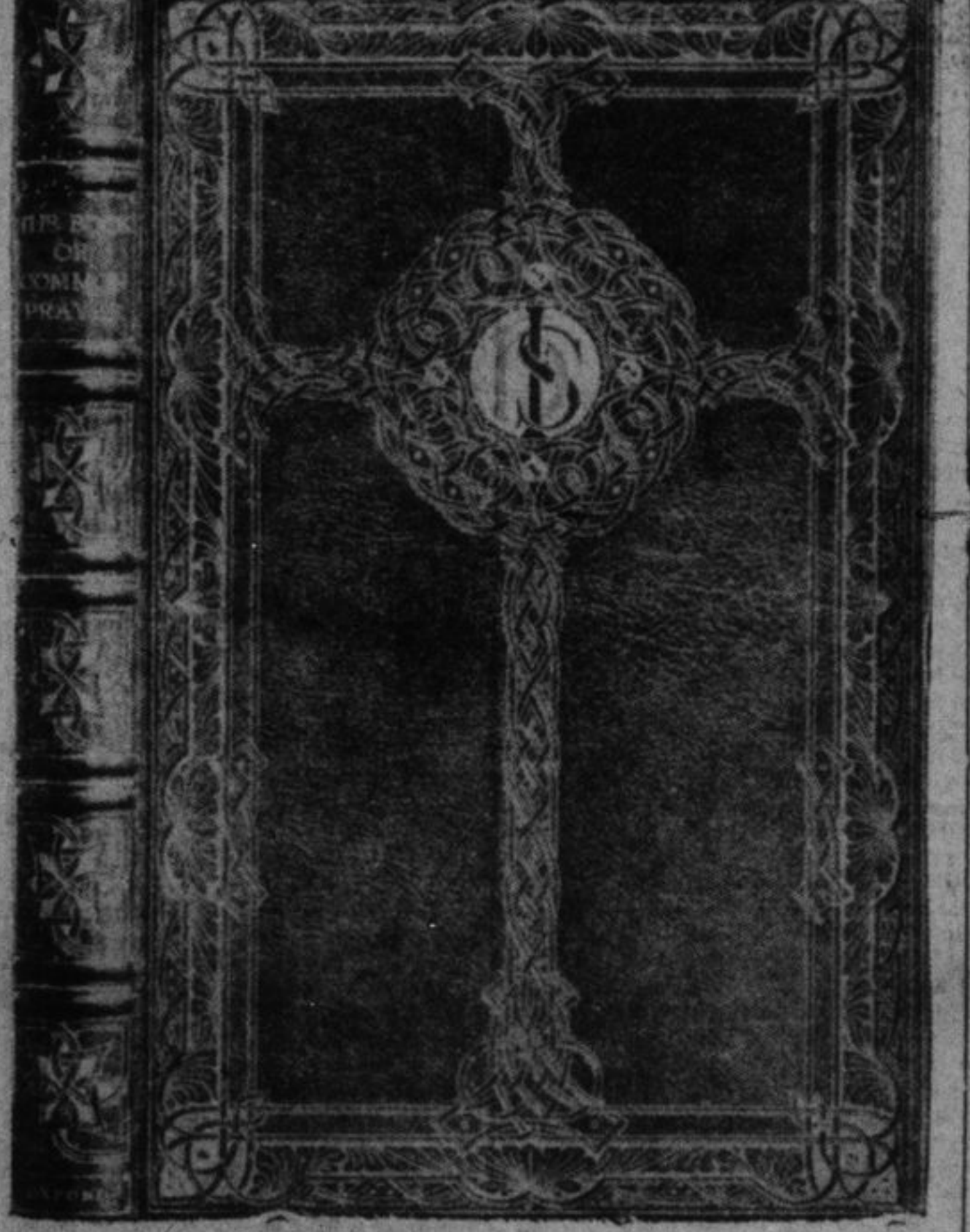

## THE KING'S PRAYER BOOK



The above is the front cover of the Prayer Book which the king has presented to the Anglican church at Annapolis Royal, Nova Scotia, where the first Anglican service was held in Canada, in commemoration of the celebration of the bicentenary of the establishment of the church in Canada. The presentation was made by the Bishop of London on behalf of his majesty.

The book is bound in red Niger Morocco, with leather joints, green levant Morocco doublures and fly-leaves, and the whole is elaborately inlaid and gold tooled and set with apothecists. The dominant feature of the design on the front cover is a decorative representation of a cross, composed of an intricate arrangement of interlaced lines and with the sacred monogram I.H.S. inlaid in the centre. The doublures are decorated with a border of a similar type of design and with the arms of his majesty on the front one and the Canadian arms on the back one.

### MONTREAL POWER COMPANIES.

#### Combine of Street Railway With Big Concerns Discussed.

Montreal, Sept. 15.—There was great excitement on the Montreal Stock Exchange, to-day, when Montreal Power took a leap from 136 to 145.1. Connected with yesterday's advance in the stock was over ten points. The activity was accompanied by rumors of a \$75,000,000 power street railway merger, and while no doubt a merger is being discussed, it is still in the future and only time will tell how the tangled web of power street railway affairs will work over ten points.

The concerns mentioned in the deal have the following capitalization:

Includes \$3,000,000 debenture stock. The talk of a general merger has been forced by the action of the Canadian Power crowd who are to-day practically in control of the Montreal street railway. This plan, to merge the street railway and Canadian Power, however, is looked upon in some quarters as an impossible project and out of the chaos bound to rise if the deal is attempted, the prophets on the "Street" see a protracted and involving the three power concerns and the Montreal Street Railway.

It is much too early to figure on the basis for such a deal, but the "Street" believes that if the deal is ever consummated, the stocks would go in at about these figures: Street Railway, 250; Montreal Power, 200; Canadian Power, 200; Shawinigan, 150. This would mean a total stock capitalization of close to \$75,000,000.
