CONCERNS TO MERGE

PUB HOUSES IN QUEBEC AND MONTREAL

A Former Boarder is Charged With Having Taken Revenge Upon His Boarding House Mistress by Throwing Bomb Into House and Causing Damage. Montreal, Sept. 21.—Two leading Canadian pub houses, with branches and warehouses in leading Canadian cities, have completed a merger. They are Holt, Renfrew & Co., Quebec, and the Dunlop-Cooke company, Montreal, Boston and Winnipeg. The output of the two firms reaches \$2,000,000 annually. The Winnipeg business of W. J. Hammond is also absorbed. The Dunlop-Cooke concern originated at Amherst, N.S., and has several branches in the estate and has been preparing a big store here.

QUEEN'S CHANCES POOR

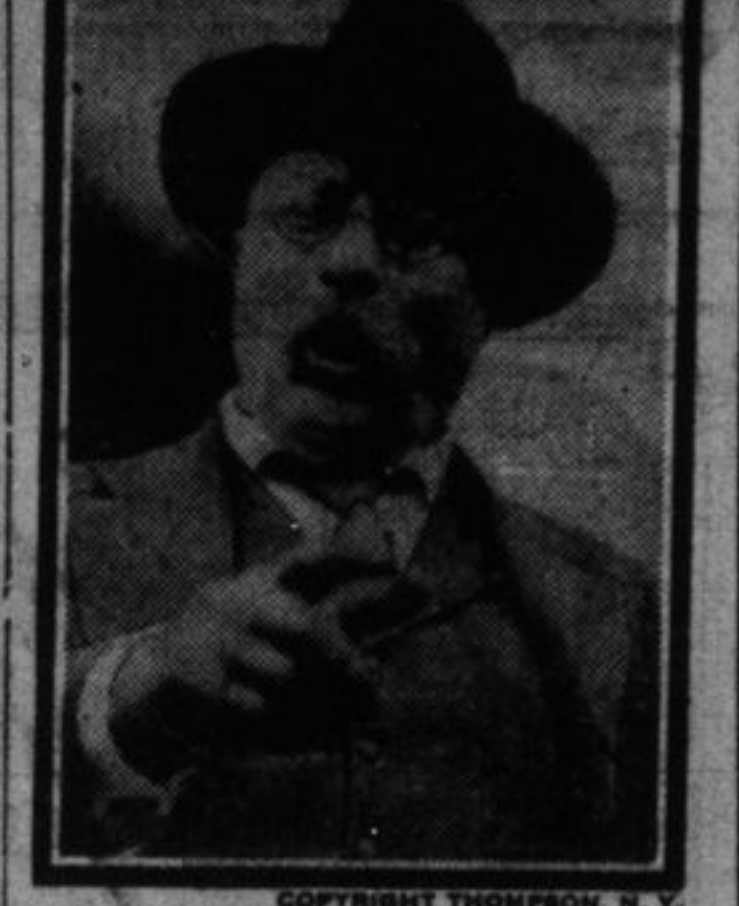
For Doing Much in Rugby—What It Says.

CLOSE OF HIGH COURT

VERDICT FOR PLAINTIFFS IN LAND CASE.

The Questions Given Jury to Answer in the Ganahook Case Heard on Tuesday—Court Reserves Judgment on Points of Law.

The sitting of the high court, was brought to a close, Wednesday noon. When court opened at eleven o'clock, the non-jury case of the Mississippi Mining Co., Ltd., vs. B. W. Folger and A. L. Folger, was continued, and after all the evidence had been taken, the court gave a verdict for the plaintiffs. This action, was to have the defendants declare themselves trustees for the plaintiffs certain lands presented, purchased by B. W. Folger, at a tax sale.

The witnesses examined, Wednesday morning, were George Laturney, George Bowden, and B. W. Folger. It was shown that in 1878, B. W. Folger purchased the lands, he was a director of the company, and the court ordered that there be a deed of conveyance of the property over to the company, a settlement to be made to Mr. Folger for money paid out by him.

In the case of Johnston vs. the Thousand Islands railway company, disposed of at Tuesday's session, and in which the jury returned a verdict of \$3,000 damages to the plaintiff, his lordship has reserved judgment on some points of law, on the verdict.

His lordship submitted a number of questions to the jury before they were tired, and from the answers it will be noticed that the jury were unanimous on the fact that the company had shown negligence. The questions and answers were as follows:

"Was the death of Jessie Johnston caused by the negligence of the defendants?"

Answer—"Yes."

"If so, wherein did such negligence consist?"

Answer—"By trainmen not being in proper place."

"Or was it occasioned by the carelessness and negligence of the said Jessie Johnston?"

Answer—"No."

"If so, wherein did her carelessness and negligence consist?"

Answer—"None on her part."

"Could the said Jessie Johnston, by the exercise of reasonable care, have avoided the accident which caused her death?"

Answer—"No."

"If so, what did she do or omit to do?"

Answer—"Did all in her power to stop the horse."

"Or was the accident caused by reason of the horse having gone beyond the control of Jessie Johnston?"

Answer—"No."

"If you answer 'yes' to the last question, was the frightening of the horse which rendered him uncontrollable caused by any negligence on the part of the defendants?"

Answer—"Yes."

"Did the fact of the fright of the horse and the want of control by Mrs. Johnston constitute to the accident?"

Answer—"No."

"If you find by the exercise of reasonable care, on the part of Jessie Johnston, the accident might have been avoided, was there anything further which the defendants, by the exercise of reasonable care, could have done to avert an accident, and if so, what?"

"By bringing train to a standstill on the west side of King street."

PIEH OF THE NEWS.

The Very Latest Cullud From All Over the World.

George Lambert, Sebastopol township, while in a state of temporary insanity took strychnine pills and died Tuesday morning.

The steamer Western States was in trouble off Long Point, Lake Erie. The police boat Groves, Cleveland, of Buffalo, N.Y., was dispatched to her aid.

A man, as yet unidentified, committed suicide, near Owen Sound, on the Canadian Pacific tracks, by throwing himself in front of the north-bound mail train.

Arthur Kuma, the nine-year-old son of Frederick Kuma, Eganville, Ont., fell from a tree and sustained a fracture of the skull, which may prove fatal.

All Pittsburg, Pa., taxi-cabs were tied up at midnight, because of a strike of chauffeurs, who declared they would not return to work until the company agrees to pay for the gasoline.

Jessie Sweet, Hamilton, Ont., twenty-one years of age, formerly of London, Ont., was arrested, on a charge of concealing birth of a child. The body of the infant was found in a valve, hanging on a peg in the young woman's boarding-house. The valve has been on the attic peg for at least nine months.

TENDERS WERE TOO HIGH.

And the Nicol Building Cannot be Erected.

"The funds available by the board are not sufficient to meet the requirements of the contractors," was the statement made by W. F. Nichol, one of the governors of the School of Mining, when asked, to-day, if tenders for the erection of the Nicol building had been awarded.

The time for receiving tenders closed yesterday, and the governors met that evening, but found that for the second time this year they were "up against it." The governors have \$40,000. The first tenders totalled nearly \$60,000. The plans were reduced, but even now the figures are much above the \$40,000, and if the building is to be erected, the governors will have to find \$10,000 more, or still further reduce the plans. They do not wish to go into debt for the building, and therefore, another year must elapse before this additional building can be reared.

General Hospital Staff Changes.

The board of governors of the general hospital has made the following appointments: Dr. G. W. Mylks, to succeed the late Dr. Wood as assistant obstetrician in the Doran building; Dr. A. R. B. Williamson to the surgical staff of the wards.
