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**MONTREAL'S CAVERNS**  
LITTLE KNOWN SEPULCHRES WHERE CLERGY LIE BURIED.

Beneath the Floor of the Great City's Life Are to Be Found Hundreds of Tombs Where Rest the Earthly Remains of Men Who Served the Altars—They Range From Archbishops to Humblest Priests.  
Far from the roar of life, the dead sleep their long sleep behind the mountain; but not all who die in Montreal are sepulchred in the quiet "city of the dead."  
The dust of many is beneath the streets over which modern life moves with feverish activity.  
Pious custom in the Roman Catholic Church, has decreed that those who serve altars shall sleep beneath them when labor is ended; and in a city so distinctively Roman Catholic as Montreal, the number of such sepulchres might be expected to be large.

Archbishops, bishops, hundreds of priests, rest beneath the sanctuaries of the various Roman Catholic churches in Montreal.  
A variety and eager life passes over their heads, but "cannot break their sleep."  
In a past day, they were influential. They filled their sacred position with ability, and with zeal. They spoke the living word.  
They delivered their solemn message, and now they rest from their labors beneath those altars which are served by others.

One can see their graves in the darkness of subterranean depths.  
By the flickering light, you can see the coffin-shaped mounds, made of concrete, which tell of sepulchres beneath; decipher the Latin inscriptions on the walls, which set forth the vanity of all things mortal, and the tragedy of human mutation.  
"Vanitas; vanitatum."  
The little army of priests of the Sulpician Order, was founded in Paris in 1641 by Monsieur Jean Jacques Oliver, and a branch of which was set up in Montreal in 1667, and who labored in the young colony under hardships of the most poignant nature, sleep under the vaults in the great Notre Dame Church which is shortly to be the scene of unequalled splendors in connection with the Eucharistic Congress.  
All told, there are 135 buried under the sanctuary in Notre Dame.  
Their names are kept in the registers of the Grand Seminary.  
"Come I will show you," said Cure Troie, of the great parish church, in that gentle voice of his.  
Down the long flight of steps, deep down into the bowels of the earth, and one sees, by the aid of the electric flash, a great stone wall, stretching across the width of the church.  
"So this, then, is the door which leads to the catacombs?"  
"No, you are mistaken. This door leads to the vault in which we keep the ornaments of the church."  
"Ornaments? Sepulchres?"  
"Yes; souvenirs of the past; gifts, relics, things of value from their age and the associations linked with them."  
"But here you see the vault which contains the dead. At least, you see it as it actually, for you see it is sealed up."  
"This vault, which contains the remains of the Sulpician priests, has been sealed up since 1875. Since that date none have been buried at Notre Dame. This church was built in 1829. We took over from the crypt of the old parish church all the bodies that were there, and deposited them in this vault. We have gone on burying in this church from that date until 1875, since which all the burials have taken place in the Grand Seminary vaults on Sherbrooke street.  
"Well, when the burials ceased, we closed up the vault. We placed this marble slab against it. And above the slab you see this picture, which tells of prayer in the presence of death."  
"Now, if one could break down this wall, what would one see?"  
"You would see a large cross in the centre of a level space. That is all."  
"The coffins have not been placed in tiers?"  
"Oh, no. They have been placed in the earth, side by side, and, of course, one on top of the other; but not ranged in the shelf-like way which you will see in the catacombs of Rome."  
"There is nothing visible, then?"  
"Nothing. There is simply the level earth, beneath which the remains rest."  
"How many would you say?"  
"Well, the list of names is carefully kept by the Grand Seminary on Sherbrooke street; but there is probably over one hundred priests buried there, belonging to the Sulpician Order—priests who served the young colony long before the Cession, and who were sent out to this country from France."  
"And bishops?"  
"One bishop—Mgr. Fabre. The rest are all priests. Now, since 1875 all the priests are buried in the vaults on Sherbrooke street."  
"Now, since that date, this vault has never been opened?"  
"Never."  
"And there is no thought of opening it?"  
"To what end? The remains are dust. We have the register. We know each name."  
At St. Ann's church, in Griffintown, the priests of the Redemptorist Order are buried in vaults which are arranged on the successive tier plan. The coffins are placed along the walls, layer upon layer, until the ceiling is reached.  
Each coffin is, of course, covered in with brick, and a brick lining separates each coffin, but the principle is that of the catacombs.  
A similar principle is carried out at the Hotel Dieu, with respect to the burial of the cloistered nuns.

**Canada on the Water.**  
Retaining its position of tenth place in the aggregate of the world's shipping, the Dominion of Canada had on its register books at the end of last year, 7,768 vessels measuring 718,333 tons, an increase of 166 vessels and 16,220 tons as compared with the corresponding year. The number of steamers on the register books on the same date was 3,229, with a gross tonnage of 513,923. Assuming the average value to be \$20 per ton, the aggregate value of net registered tonnage would be \$21,586,500.  
The number of new vessels built and registered during the year was 267, measuring 39,300 tons net. By making the value of new tonnage at \$45 per ton gives a total of \$1,768,500 for new vessels. During the year 246 vessels were removed from the register books.  
It is estimated that 26,430 men and boys were employed on ships registered in Canada during the year.  
Ontario leads in the number of vessels, with Nova Scotia a close second. The former has 2,100 with tonnage of 208,542 and the latter 2,658 with 160,288 tonnage.

**Make a Nickel Anyway.**

**PROFESSIONAL EATERS.**  
Singular Custom Still Prevailing Among Indians of the Northwest.

Many striking customs of their past are still preserved by the Indians of the Northwest, and of these none is more interesting than a peculiar practice yet followed by the Sioux. It appears that from time immemorial these Sioux have adhered to an etiquette whereby it is the bounden duty of the host to supply his guest with all the food he may desire, and, as a rule, the appointment set before the visiting Indian is in excess of the capacity of a single man.  
On the other hand, by the same custom, the guest is obliged to eat all that is placed before him, else he grossly insults his entertainer. Now, it was found that this practice would be a hardship, but, instead of dispensing with the custom, the Indian method of reasoning was applied, and what is known as the professional eater was brought to the front.  
While the guest is supposed to eat all that is placed before him, it serves the same purpose if his neighbor assists in devouring the bountiful repast, the main object being to have the plate clean when the meal shall be finished.  
It is not always practicable to depend upon a neighbor at table to assist in getting away with a large dinner, and in order to insure the final consumption of the allotted portion visiting Indians call upon these professional eaters, whose duty it is to sit beside them through a meal and eat what the guest cannot stow away.  
The professional eaters are never looked upon in the light of guests, but more as traveling companions with a particular duty to perform.  
These eaters receive from \$1 to \$2 and even \$3 for each meal where they assist. It is stated that one of the professional eaters was known to have disposed of some seven pounds of beef at a sitting.

**The Unblessed Meek.**  
Bishop Farthing of Montreal is a man of striking and aggressive personality. In the old days, when he was rector of a church in the diocese of Huron, he showed on more than one occasion that he was not one of those clergymen who believe in letting sleeping dogs lie. He never took a passive attitude for the sake of peace when he felt that he ought to take action in any matter, and on more than one occasion he displayed his disapproval of men who were inclined to be perfectly satisfied so long as Sunday came round once every seven days and thus gave them a chance to air their eloquence.  
Several years ago, Canon Farthing was visiting in Toronto during the meeting of the Synod, and on that occasion he took the opportunity to express his disapproval of the passive type of man. He described how they gave the whole church a reputation which did not fit with its claim to be being militant, and told a story to illustrate his point.  
He said a certain Anglican rector discovered that a district in which he labored contained a man who served to be brought to book for a series of offenses against the community. He was a bold bully in the locality, because there had been no one to bring him to book, so the clergyman started things moving. When the man went to his lawyer, the legal gentleman asked how the prosecutions were started, and the man told him.  
"I am surprised to hear that," said the lawyer, "I always had a great respect for Anglican clergymen, as I thought they never took the trouble to interfere with anything."
