HARDLY CONSISTENT

WITH KINGSTON'S CLAIM TO HAVE "THE GOODS"

When Board of Education Proposes to Turn Out Non-Residents—D. D. Rogers Writes on the Subject.

Kingston, Sept. 26.—(To the Editor)—The proposed action of the Board of Education, of excluding all non-resident pupils from the Collegiate Institute is not at all consistent with the spirit of the slogan accepted as the best to advance Kingston's interest: "Kingston's got the goods; call up Kingston."

The board should consider the matter carefully before making it public that such a great educational centre as Kingston is supposed to be could not find accommodation for about 50 non-resident pupils. No doubt the position is somewhat perplexing, but surely there is some other remedy than the one now proposed.

The County of Frontenac is exceptional in its regards to education. It is the village of Sydenham, about sixteen miles north of Kingston, and six municipalities, Pittsburg, Wolfe Island, Howe Island, Garden Island, Portsmouth and the township of Kingston, who pay by far the larger portion of the divinity rate, at no direct benefit from it, as they find it more advantageous, for many reasons, to pay the high tuition fees charged by the board the maximum fee being \$30 a year.

It is not doing justice to the scholars who have been attending the school for years, to be obliged to break away from old associations and look for another school, especially after a month's attendance.

And where will they go? Sydenham high school is over-crowded now, and the inspector says better accommodation is required, or he will report against the school. In the past few years we have spent thousands of dollars in renovating and improving the building and surroundings, and also engaged a fourth teacher. All considered, the cost to the county has about doubled in the past 7 or 8 years. Unfortunately the tendency of the rising generation is away from the farm, to other callings in life. Whether it is faulty system of education or unjust and discriminating legislation against our interests, it is a wise man and a public benefactor who can solve the question.

It is a self-evident fact that the agricultural education of our youth has been sadly neglected. If we could realize what some of the European countries are doing in the interest of agricultural science, it might spur us into action. We have the agricultural college at Guelph, which is doing a good work and is being appreciated more every year to such an extent that it is filled to overflowing, and President Creelman reports that there are more applications this year than ever. If so why not have a branch established in Eastern Ontario, where the nature of the soil, the adaptability of the locality to certain lines of farming, all argue that we should have such an institution in the east.

Such being the case I would make the suggestion that the Ontario government buy the Sydenham High School for that purpose and join the county, with the proceeds, join the city for high school purposes, and provide ample accommodation for all.

The subject has too wide a scope to attempt to do justice to it in a short article, but I think the scheme is feasible, and would be an advantage, too, from an economic standpoint. I would like to have a public opinion from our energetic M.P.'s, on the matter and from any others interested.—D. D. ROGERS.

TENNIS TOURNAMENT

To be Held at Queen's on Oct. 13th and 14th. The Canadian Intercollegiate Lawn Tennis Tournament is to be held on the 13th and 14th of October, on Queen's University courts, beginning at ten o'clock on the morning of the 13th. The events will be singles and doubles, each win scoring one point for the club represented by the winner or winners. Accordingly, there will be singles, doubles and team championships.

Each match will consist of the best two out of three advantage sets with the exception of the final matches, which shall consist of the best three out of five advantage sets.

The draw for the first round of the tournament will take place at 9 a.m., of Thursday 13th, at Queen's University. Slazenger balls are to be used. Spiked shoes are prohibited.

According to the rules of the association, only four separate entries in singles and two separate entries in doubles shall represent each club. As the club sees fit, its team may consist of four, five, six, seven, or eight members, that is, the doubles need not be composed of the same four men as the singles.
