THE LATE CHARLES D. CHOWN

Died in Montreal on Saturday From Typhoid Fever.

The many friends of Charles D. Chown, a former resident of this city, were shocked to hear of his death in Montreal, Saturday evening, from typhoid fever, after an illness of about six weeks. The remains came up on the G.T.R. last train Monday noon, and were taken in charge by E. J. Reid, undertaker. The funeral will take place, Tuesday morning, from the residence of Dr. A. P. Chown, King street west.

The late Charles Chown was the second son of the late Edward Chown, of Chown and Gougeon's foundry. He was born in Kingston, fifty-five years ago, and received his early education here. When quite a young man he entered into the foundry business, and upon the death of his father, he took his place. Upon dissolution of the partnership, he conducted a hardware and dairy-supply business. About five years ago, he removed to Montreal, where he was engaged in the real estate business. His wife predeceased him about sixteen years ago. Three sons, Edwin, of Winnipeg, Clarence, of Montreal, and Gordon, here, attending Queen's and one daughter, Edith, also a student here, survive, as well as five brothers and one sister: Dr. E. A. Chown, B.D., Toronto; Dr. H. Chown, Winnipeg; Dr. A. P. Chown, Kingston; S. T. Chown, lawyer, Renfrew, and Miss Alice Chown, Kingston.

The body was accompanied from Montreal by Edith and Clarence, also Miss Conley, an aunt, who went down there a short time ago. S. T. Chown, is here from Renfrew. Dr. E. A. Chown is at present touring the continent, and will be unable to be here for the funeral. Deceased was a Methodist in religion.

London, Sept. 26.—Honors are falling thick upon the shoulders of Lord Pentland. He has been elevated to the peerage, the last honor given by King Edward, and now he is to be the governor-general of Australia in place of Lord Dudley.

SHOT WHILE HUNTING

SAD DEATH OF ARNOLD BOYD NEAR MERRICKVILLE.

He Was a Brother of Orville Boyd, of This City—Was Out on Camping Trip With Wife and Other Friends—Rifle Accidentally Discharged in His Boat.

A telegram, received in the city, on Sunday night, by Orville Boyd, clerk in J. Gilbert's store, Barris street, and living at 294 Barris street, told of the death of his brother, Arnold Boyd, and the circumstances surrounding the case are particularly sad. He met death by the accidental discharge of his rifle, while out hunting near Merrickville, on Saturday.

Full particulars were not received in the city, but from the information available, it appears that deceased and his wife were out camping with a party of other friends, near Merrickville, his home. Boyd went out in his boat alone, and it is believed that when he was getting out of the boat, his rifle caught against the boat, and was discharged. One side of his face was blown off. When he did not appear at the camp a search was made for him, and his body was not found until Sunday morning.

Deceased was twenty-three years of age, and was only married about a year ago. He had visited in this city on a number of occasions, and had friends here, and they were very sorry to learn of his untimely end. Orville Boyd left early this morning for Merrickville. Deceased is survived by his father and mother, three brothers and one sister. Deceased was employed at a foundry, in Smith's Falls, as a pattern maker, and was a very clever young man, with every promise of a brilliant career.
