A GOODLY HERITAGE

PROF. M. B. BAKER SPEAKS OF NEW ONTARIO.

Agriculture as Well as Mining Booming There—The Professor Has Returned After Examining the Alleged Coal Fields.

Prof. M. B. Baker, professor of geology in Queen's university, has returned to the city, after spending the summer in a geological examination of the alleged coal fields of New Ontario, for the Bureau of Mines Toronto. Prof. Baker left Toronto with a party of assistants in May and spent the summer north of the Transcontinental railway, his immediate field being down the Matagami River, 125 miles from the railway. He reports that the so-called coal is merely a poor grade of slightly consolidated lignite and quite useless for economic purposes.

Prof. Baker reports, however, that about twenty miles farther down the Matagami, at Grand Rapids, a promising area of lignite coal is found. This red or brown iron ore of excellent quality, set free from sulphur, and with only the smallest trace of phosphorus. This ore is found on both banks of the Matagami river, and across the whole bed of the river and is attracting considerable attention from iron men. The details of both the iron and lignite areas are being prepared by Prof. Baker for the annual report of the Bureau of Mines, so no figures as to tonnage, or analysis of the ores could be given out yet.

THE BANKERS BUSY.

They are Arranging for a Football Team. The bankers of the city are getting a football team into shape. They are having a hard time of it, though, as it is hard work to get the boys to turn out to practice. Bankers have very uncertain hours. This makes it very difficult to get a team together. It is understood that H. W. Walker, of the Bank of Montreal, will coach the team. He is busily engaged at present in drafting a rule book. Should there be a possibility of the getting a team they will likely play the Collegiate I and R.M.C. II.

The Credit Men.

The Canadian merchants are moving in the direction of protecting themselves against frauds and deadbeats. In Winnipeg recently the Canadian Credit Men's Association met and decided to raise a fund of \$10,000 for the prosecution of unscrupulous persons who prey upon the business men. Some recent cases in which it was successful in bringing frauds to justice were discussed, and plans for making the association still more useful in the future were formulated. The association will seek further legislative aid for the obtaining of credit by means of fraudulent financial statements submitted to mercantile agencies, also as to the issuance of cheques on banks where no funds are on deposit at the time such cheques are issued. Undoubtedly an association of this sort is capable of rendering valuable services to the trade in discouraging dishonesty in business life.

License Was Transferred.

At a special meeting of the board of license commissioners, held on Monday evening, the license of the American hotel was transferred from the S. Harkness estate, to Frederick Whitney, and the latter took charge of the hotel, to-day. Those present at the meeting were Andrew McMahon, the chairman, James Mallen, and George W. Henig, Frederick Whitney was also present at the session.

A Very Timely Criticism.

Montreal Witness. The public was astonished by a sentence of the acting recorder, Judge Leet, who gave a man two months with the option of a fine of twenty-five dollars, for the most heinous crime of the calendar, that of peddling cocaine, and six months, without the option of a fine, for vagrancy, which is in itself no crime at all. The twenty-five dollars fine was possibly an improvement on a former judgment, which made the fine two dollars, perhaps a sarcasm on an impotent law. The fact is that the punishment imposed by Judge Leet is the largest that the law, as it stands, admits of. It is ridiculously inadequate. Criminal druggists sell three dollars' worth of the poison to intermediaries for ten dollars and the peddler sells it to boys and girls for a hundred. There is plenty of money in it, no matter how often this twenty-five dollar fine is raised. The other sentence which Judge Leet was able to add in the case in question, of six months for vagrancy, was, under a section of the law which allows this punishment for a man getting his living by crime. When the crime is that of poisoning the lives of children, it is a small punishment for so great a villain.

A First Aid Corps.

A "First Aid" corps will be organized this week under the auspices of St. John's Ambulance Society. Men will be taken from the local mills, factories and workshops, and local physicians will in turn deliver the lectures and instructions. The meeting for organization will be held at the office of a local doctor to be named later.

Flouting the Law.

Manitoba Free Press. The dominion election law was openly flouted by the action of the election agent of Mr. Haggart in making a sworn statement that Mr. Haggart's expenses in contesting this city in the last dominion election amounted to \$17. The provincial election law has now been still more flagrantly violated by the return of a statement, which is published in the Manitoba Gazette, by the election agent of Lendrum McMeans, the member for South Winnipeg, that the "election expenses incurred by and on behalf of Lendrum McMeans" were "nil." Gentlemen who thus signalize their election as lawmakers by flouting the law are, in insolent disrespect of the law, are to say the least of it, not showing a good example of citizenship. Everybody in Winnipeg knows that committee rooms and halls were engaged on behalf of Mr. McMeans, telephones were installed in the committee rooms, there was much printed campaign matter got out, advertisements were placed in the daily papers, and there were their election expenses. Statements of the election expenses in the other constituencies of the province, ranging as high as the neighborhood of \$500, are published in the official Gazette. Has a license been issued to Lendrum McMeans empowering him to violate the law?

Food-Growing Dearer.

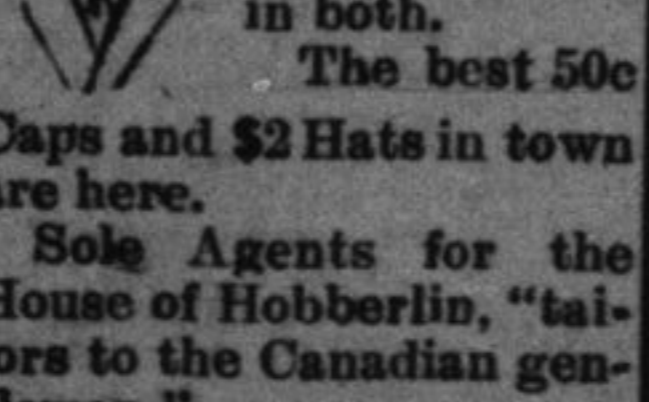
Toronto Star. Evidence of the increase in the cost of living is furnished by the Toronto Weekly Star, in a table headed "Quotations for this week and comparisons with previous weeks." We select the figures for this week and the corresponding week in 1909. In cattle the increase is from 94.50 to 86.25 per hundred pounds; in sheep, from 83.25 to 85; in lambs, from 84 to 86.25; in hogs, from 87.50 to 89.25. Fall wheat has increased from 71c. a bushel to 95c.; oats, from 39c. to 43c.; eggs, from 14c. to 22c.; a dozen, live chickens, from 75c. to 12c.; a pound, butter, from 18c. to 23c. for separator prints, and from 19c. to 24c. for creamery prints. Cheese shows a very slight increase, from 10c. to 11c. These are the prices paid to farmers.
