SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON WHO IS THE SOLE head of a family, or any male over 15 years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta.

Any person who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price, \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect house worth \$300.00.

LOCAL OPTION VOTE

MAY BE TAKEN IN GANANOQUE IN JANUARY.

Death of John C. Stafford, of Leeds. Aged Seventy-nine Years—Hotel Man Lost Twenty-one Dollars.

Gananoque, Sept. 29.—The death occurred on Tuesday evening of another of the pioneers of Leeds township, in the person of John C. Stafford, who passed away at his home, Front of Leeds and Lansdowne, after an illness extending over several months. Deceased was in the seventy-ninth year of his age.

A local hotelman met with a serious loss on Tuesday. Having taken in twenty-one dollars he sent to the cash register to take it within, laid the money down and walked to the front, and on returning his \$21 had disappeared.

The coal schooner Horace Taber arrived yesterday, from Oswego, with a cargo.

Boiler Inspector Latour, of Toronto, is in town in the interests of the insurance companies, testing boilers in the local factories. The water was shut off from the local factories last evening until to-morrow morning.

The Spring and Lake company is using their new 300 horse power engine for motive power, to-day, while the water is shut off. It was used for some time yesterday afternoon for a trial and gave good satisfaction.

A light docket was presented at the division court session, here, yesterday. There is considerable talk among the local temperance party of instituting a campaign for local option, the vote to be submitted to the electors at the municipal elections in January.

A meeting was held in Grace church, last evening, to formulate plans, and finally decide on the feasibility of the venture.

IN MARINE CIRCLES.

Arrivals and Departures of Vessels at this Port.

The schooner Major Ferry cleared for Fairhaven.

The steamship John Randall, cleared for Oswego.

The steamship Navajo, arrived at Conway, with coal, from Oswego.

At Swift's wharf, Steamers Toronto and Aletha down and to-day; steamer Rideau King cleared for Portland this morning; steamer Belleville, up, to-day.

M.T. Co.'s elevator, Steamer Fairmount, which cleared for Fort William, yesterday, had the barge 'Sikirk' in tow; she will load coal, at Ashabula, for Montreal; tug 'Eaton', from Montreal, three light barges, Steamer Westwood, and barge 'Cargara', loaded with 140,000 bushels of wheat, and barley, from Fort William will arrive, Friday night.

Protest From Pilots. Kingston pilots take objection to the report that there was a scarcity of pilots here this week. They refer to the case of one steamer, and state that the captain refused to take on local pilots, preferring to wait for a pilot to come from Montreal. One vessel was held here for twenty-four hours, and a local pilot, it was claimed was given the eight, at night, after the vessel had been tied up for several hours waiting for the outside pilot.

BROUGHT TO PENITENTIARY. Will Serve Two Years on a Charge of Theft.

In August, Ernest Bauer stole a book of Dominion Express money orders from F. B. Nairn, of the Canadian Canners company, limited, at Aylmer, Ont. There were nine orders in the book which could be filled up to a sum of \$50 each, and a couple of weeks ago one order was cashed at Stratford, by the Canadian Express, for \$40. It was found that Mr. Nairn's name had been forged. At the trial, in St. Thomas, the accused was found guilty, and Magistrate Hunt gave him two years in the penitentiary.

A Great Need of Men.

President Mackenzie, of the Canadian Northern railway, has indicated that unless the government permits the use of Oriental labor in connection with the building of the transcontinental line, it may be necessary to bring in negroes, presumably from the southern states.

The railroad builders in Canada are suffering severely from the scarcity and cost of labor. On the Transcontinental \$3.50 a day and board is being paid to laborers. At the time of the building of the Canadian Pacific, twenty-five years ago, an arrangement existed under which the railway builders brought in coolie labor from China in bond. The scheme worked well, and was an undoubted benefit to Canada in that it provided the necessary labor without inflicting upon this country a permanent increase of Chinese population.
