The history of mining in this section of Eastern Ontario has not been as successful as the richness of the ore deposits would warrant. To be carried on successfully, iron mining must be on a large scale. Heretofore, the par-ties working the properties carried on the business in a "hand to mouth" manner, simply taking out the best ore, shipping it, and on the money received carrying on the work until another shipment could be secured, This policy was detrimental to the progress of mining, but notwithstanding this poor way of mining the ore, there has been over 100,000 tone of ore shipped from the Wilbur properties. The new company, composed of a group of American capitalists, are prepared to work the mines on a sufficithe extensive scale it make it profitable venture. They are equippin eneir properties with the very lates macainery, and will handle and treat their ore in the most scientific manner. From the very outset, they plan to ship 1,000 tons of ore daily, and inside six months they expect to increase this to 2,000 tons per day. Previous to the taking over of these mines the American syndicate had ex-

haustive reports prepared by such well known authorities as Dr. Robert Bell, for many years the Canadian government geologist and one of the most widely recognized mining authorities a the world; by Professor R. Carr Marris, late professor of engineering at the Royal Military College, King-ston, and engineer for the Quebec government, etc.; and a third report was made by J. G. McNulty, another well known mining engineer. The reports of the three were so uniformy favorable that the properties were purchased and at the present time ex-tensive plans are being undertaken for their immediate development.
