

Foreign Feeling-No Knowledge

This news is taken as an explanation of the sending of troops and warships to China. It has been reported here that troops would be soon on the way to China, but no confirmation could be obtained. Enquiries sent by cable to Washington brought the answer that there was no official knowledge of such a move.

It has been learned now that there is imminent danger of a general revolt in China, and that the bitter anti-foreign feelings make it necessary for the powers to have troops ready to move at a month's notice.

It is believed that the military au thorities here have been in constant touch with United States Minister Calhoun at Pekin, and that the arrangements for transporting of troops have been made as the result of information received in cypher de spatches through official channels.
