## The Man On Watch.

If the county councilmen are not concerned enough about the youth of Frontenac to give them secondary education, let the clamorings of those who are interested be directed against them, and not against the school trustee board of Kingston, says the Lampman, who agrees that the question of excluding the non-residents from the town's grammar school is wholly a business one. Frontenac has no right to expect Kingston to educate its children for nothing, and if its own council does not see fit to provide the education, Frontenac pays Kingston for maintaining its poor and for caring for its sick, that requires hospital attention. Why, also, should it not pay reasonably for the education of its youth here?

The Lampman hears that the rolls of the town assessor, which have been just completed, show that the marriages that have taken place in Kingston for the past five or six years have been very unproductive, and have not added the population as they should. He thinks that the town clerk, when he makes up the rolls, should speak out on this matter as Father Vaughan did in Montreal. There is not the percentage of births in Kingston that there should be, and if marriages continue to be unproductive, what hope is there for this old town?

Prof. James Elliott's declaration that people do not want their names mentioned in connection with shady enterprises and yet will give their time and money in promoting them, directly and indirectly, struck the Lampman as being only too true. Perhaps Prof. Elliott, he thinks, may have known of cases of this kind when he resided in Kingston. No doubt he agrees that churches should not own property that is leased to saloons, nor should good churchmen allow their property to be liquor dispensaries, when it might make a good store. The Lampman knows men who carry their Bibles to church every Sunday, sing loudly at the service, and even work in the Sabbath school—who lease their property to saloons. Prof. Elliott no doubt had these in mind as some of those who are connected with shady enterprises. Of course there are others.

The other day the Lampman listened to a discussion between a policeman and a town official, regarding school truancy. The policeman declared that the one to look after boys who played truant from school was not a policeman, but the teacher, in whose class the erring boy was. He claimed that if the teacher was what he or she should be, there would be no trouble in gaining the interest and confidence of the roaming boy, who would respond to kindness and attention. The teacher could do far more than the police could. The Lampman feels that there is a good deal in this argument. A kind-hearted teacher can win the most unruly boy. This has been proven right in Kingston. Abuse will not do it.
