Would Buy Storrington Road.

Councillor Rankin will bring the question of purchase of the toll road, owned by the Kingston and Storrington road company, before the county council at its November session. He will move that the county offer the road company a certain sum for the highway on which it collects toll. If the road company refuses the offer, the matter will have to go to arbitration. A few days ago, the Ontario inspector of toll roads was here to inspect the road and see if the company had carried out the improvements that he had ordered last spring in order to put the highway in the condition for travel that the collection of toll demanded. It seems that a company has no right to collect toll on a road unless it is in good repair, and it seems that the inspector reported that the Kingston-Storrington road needed a good deal of re-levelling, some of which has been since done.
