IN MARINE CIRCLES.

Arrivals and Departures of Vessels at This Port.

The steamer Mississquoi was up from Gananoque, to-day. The steamer Alexandria was at Folger's wharf, last night, from Montreal and discharged considerable freight, for local merchants.

At Swift's wharf: Steamer Aletha, down and up, to-day; steamer Blanche, from Montreal to-day; steamer Belleville, up, to-night; steamer Bi-deau King, from Portland, 'this afternoon.

The Kingston dry-dock presented a busy scene, last evening, with three boats there for repairs. The men are rushed just as fast as they can go. Last night, crews working on the Sackatoon and Keystorm worked all night to hurry the job through.

The steamer Gordon was at the Kingston dry-dock for a short time last night, having some of her plates tightened. The steamer Sackatoon is outside the dry-dock now, having some of her plates tightened in the bow of the boat. The cargo has all been moved to the stern so as to raise the fore part of the ship out of the water.

M. T. Co's elevator: The steamer Omuka arrived from Chicago and transhipped 50,000 bushels of corn, cleared for Oswego, to load coal, for Fort William; tug haul cleared for Montreal with two barges, grain-laden, tug Mary cleared for Montreal, with two grain-laden barges; tug Emerson arrived, Saturday afternoon, from Lake Erie, with two coal barges, and cleared for Montreal; steamer Fort William will arrive to-night from Fort William with grain, and will have in tow the barge Selkirk, loaded with coal from Lake Erie.

WANT ONE-YEAR TERM.

Board to Trade to Discuss Three-Year Aldermanic Term.

The council of the board of trade, last evening, decided to present to the board at its meeting next Tuesday evening, a resolution to the effect that the city council be asked to take steps to secure the required legislation to have the three-year aldermanic term changed back to the old term of one year. Some business men are inclined to take the view that the best interest of the city are not served by the three-year term for aldermen, and there is no doubt but that the board of trade will adopt the resolution to be presented to it. The three-year term came into force in January, 1907, when J. McD. Mowat was mayor for the second year. Mr. Mowat was the chief mover in regard to inaugurating the increased term, and he has since defended it, strongly.

THE FAIR AT ODESSA

HELD ON FRIDAY AND WAS A SUCCESS AS USUAL.

The Exhibits Were all Good—Horse Races Pulled Off on the Travelled Road, as the Fair Grounds Track Was Too Heavy.

The township of Ernestown annual fair has once more passed into history as one that will not be forgotten. A great many people said that the fair could not be run successfully without the aid of the bar-room. The fair was awaited with much interest in that account. If anyone had any misgivings as to the success of the enterprise he was quickly deceived upon entering the grounds. The heavy rains of the past two days caused many persons to stay away, but notwithstanding this fact, the grounds were crowded. At 2:15 o'clock the new agricultural hall built about two years ago by the directors of the fair on ground that was donated by Sidney Sproule, was opened to the public after the exhibits had been judged. The people jammed into the hall until there was not room to turn around. Upon first entering the building a large sign with Campbell Bros' name was seen where they had a display. Right across the aisle, John McKay & Co., also had a fair exhibit. As one passed down the broad aisles, many work in plenty was seen and of the very best patterns and skill too. Heintzman and Co. had an exhibition of pianos in the centre and a little further down Toomey and Oswald, of Odessa, had an exhibition of harness, etc. George Mills and Co. attracted a great deal of attention with their Teddy Bears. Among the firms from the city who distributed advertising matter were, Steacy and Steacy, Lockett Shoe Store, Harvey Mills, F. W. Coates, C. W. Lane, W. J. Crothers.

The exhibits outside of the building were exceptionally good. The horse, cattle, poultry and swine were far better than have been seen at some of the fairs. The vegetables in the building were much admired on account of their large size and perfect form. The Citizens Band, of Odessa, on the grounds during the afternoon and provided a choice programme of music. Nearly every fair has some accident to be remembered and this one was not excepted. One man went home with one wheel nearly torn off his buggy as the result of a collision with another rig in the road.

On account of the recent heavy rains the races were not pulled off over the track on the grounds, and had to be run in the main road. There were only two but they were very closely contested. They were run over a half-mile course. The first race was a trotting race and resulted as follows: 1st, horse owned by Earlward Kaylor; 2nd, horse owned by Archibald Loyal; 3rd, horse owned by William Storey; 4th, horse owned by P. Crowton. The running race was the source of much excitement to the onlookers as the last two horses had to race the second time for second place. The result was: 1st, E. Parrott; 2nd, Clarence Sharpe; 3rd, James Carroll.
