COMING TO THE GRAND.

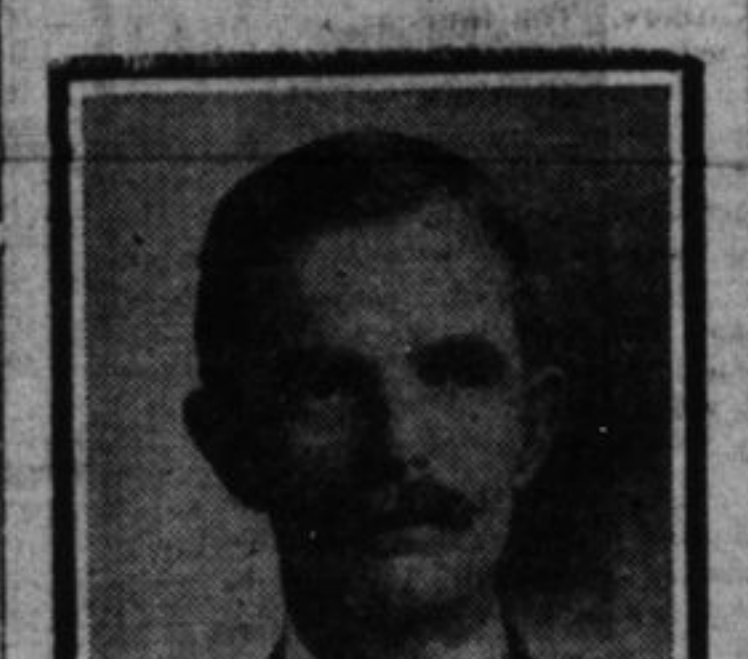
Art and Music for Monday Night.
