THE FRENCH STRIKE.

It Has Now Spread to All Lines—Effective at Once.

Paris, Oct. 12.—The national confederation of railway unions voted at one o'clock, this morning, in favor of a general strike on all the railway systems. Instructions were given that the vote should be made effective immediately.

The city of Paris is threatened with a scarcity of food supplies. Freight, mail and passenger transportation is partially restricted and the vast army of working people in the North-West are unable to reach their places of business. Military engineers are taking the places of the strikers, and troops are guarding various stations and important sections of the roads. Large military forces were hastily distributed on the first evidence that a strike had been declared, and additional troops were ordered out last night.
