**A SCENIC EFFECT**

TAR, FEATHERS AND WHIP FOR PERSISTENT SWAIN.

Young Man of Huntsville District Alleges Sweetheart's Family Abused Him Saturday Night.

Huntsville, Oct. 12.—Tar in liberal quantities, with feathers, added for scenic effect, was applied to Charles Abner Baker, aged twenty-one, who lives a few miles out of Huntsville, on Saturday night, last. Monday, Baker laid a complaint, and Chief of Police Watson, Huntsville, served a summons on Thomas Spier, a well-known farmer of the district, calling him to court to defend himself. Baker also alleges that during the evening a horsewhip was used on him by Spier. They have been put in as evidence in the case.

She left home and entered the employ of a town resident as a domestic. Enraged by the per sistance of the girl, Spier gave Baker three days in which to leave the country, but Baker did not go.

Saturday night while on his way to Huntsville, Baker met Spier coming from the town. Baker alleges that Spier put upon him, tied his hands and led him to his (Spier's) house, declaring "I'll fix you."
