DEATH PENALTY

PERPETRATOR OF BRUTAL CRIME WILL BE EXECUTED.

Enraged by Wife's Scolding, Weedmark Murdered Her in Drunken Frenzy—Daughter Gave Damaging Evidence Against Her Father—To Hang on December 14th.

Perth, Oct. 12.—Rufus Weedmark, of Smith's Falls, was tried here today, before Chancellor Boyd and a jury and found guilty of the murder of his wife, Kate, in their humble home on Main street, in Smith's Falls in the early morning hours of Saturday, April 30th last.

The crown contended that Weedmark had made up his mind to kill his wife for revenge on her in sending him to the Central Prison for six months for non-support. The plea of the defence was that Weedmark was provoked by his wife, who, it was alleged, had thrown a teapot at him when he was under the influence of a drink, thereby so enraging him that he had lost control of his senses and choked her to death on the floor of the home. The killing was not disputed. The question turned on the point whether Weedmark had received provocation. The jury returned a unanimous verdict after forty-five minutes' deliberation that Weedmark was guilty of murder.

Weedmark remained stolid throughout the trial, even when his own daughter was giving evidence against him. When his lordship was passing sentence of death on him Weedmark gave no outward sign that he appreciated or cared for the awful meaning of the court's pronouncement.

The crown's story was told in two hours' time and was pieced together by E. A. DuVernet. The defence was handled by C. J. Foy, of Perth.

Dr. C. L. B. Stammers swore that he had been called to Weedmark's home a little after four o'clock that Saturday morning, and had found Weedmark standing in the living-room and found his wife lying on a lounge dead with livid marks on her throat. To the witness Weedmark had said, "I did it. Doc. Did I? I make a good job of it, Doc, eh?"

The fourteen-year-old daughter of the prisoner told of going downstairs early on Saturday morning and seeing her father choking her mother.

Mr. Foy, counsel for prisoner, called Weedmark in his own behalf. Weedmark said he was fifty-four years old and had been twice married. His first wife had died fourteen months after their marriage, and he had married his second wife twenty years ago. They had five daughters.

He swore he had drunk about three pints and a half of liquor between 4 in the afternoon and nine in the evening of the Friday previous to the tragedy. In the evening about nine o'clock when his wife came home she had asked him to get her a drink of whiskey, and he refused. His wife annoyed him with her "chewing the rag." They had fallen asleep in the sitting-room. After waking about half-past two he had ordered the children to go upstairs. He had then asked his wife to get him a drink of water, and wept foretold, during which she had thrown a teapot at him.

"I lost my head altogether, and choked her to death," he said. "When I grabbed her I had no intention of killing her. I was drunk and didn't know what I was doing. I am sorry for it, both for children and myself. There would never be any row until there was whiskey around."

Dr. Bruce Smith swore he examined prisoner on May 11th, and found him in excellent condition, both mentally and physically. This closed the case of counsel for defence.

The case was given to the jury at 3.30, and at 4.15 they returned a verdict of guilty.

FIGHTING THE HOOK-WORM.

Three Hundred Thousand Cases in Porto Rico.

Washington, Oct. 14.—A picture of confidence in the future of sound business enterprise and extension of investments and operations is given in the annual report of the governor of Porto Rico. The census just taken will show a population of over 1,100,000, or 210 per square mile.

A campaign against the hook-worm has been conducted with island funds. At the fifty-five dispensaries throughout the island 49,407 patients were treated, resulting in 19,423 complete cures and the improvement of 6,966 cases. The situation is much improved, but in the mountain districts it is conservatively estimated that the number still afflicted is at least 300,000.

Customs Barriers Between United States Have Been Broken Down—Collector at St. Paul, Minn., Has Been Advised.

Washington, Oct. 14.—Customs barriers, between the United States, have been broken down, in favor of donations, by Canadians for the forest fire sufferers, in the north-west. Collector of Customs Johnson, at St. Paul, Minn., was advised by the government that the Canadian donations of emergency food, clothing, supplies, for the fire sufferers, may be admitted as international act of courtesy. This action follows advice from Collector Johnson, who has charge of the customs district, embracing the fire devastated area, reporting that Beaudette and the country miles around had been burned, that several hundred persons perished in the fire, and that several thousand others are left homeless and destitute. Canada, the collector reported, is donating supplies and contributions of all kinds.
