Thousand Island Park Directors Renew Agreement for Period of Five

directors of the Thousand Island Park Association the "syndicate" agreement by which the island resort has been governed for years will continue for five years more, The decision to continue, by this agreement sets at rest a report to the effect that with the expiration of the agreement in e turned into a St. Lawrence Coney

The Thousand Island Park Associa ion is capitalized at \$50,000 and has entire control over the park. The company originally purchased 1,000 acres of land on Wells Island, which has since, by sale, seen reduced to 750 acres, on which the park is located. This has been governed for years by the "syndicate" agreement, an agree-ment reached among the majority of

There have been reports of dissension among the stockholders, and it s admitted that there is a certain lement which is desirous of turning he park into an amusement resort. However, the majority of the stock by but a few hundred dollars worth is in the hands of those who have confucted the present system of man-gement. These directors to-day voted o continue the present system for five

years from next August.
