QUEEN'S FIELD DAY THE SPORT REVIEW

D. E. FOSTER AGAIN WON THE CHAMPIONSHIP. John Mackinnon Was Second, and W. McCartney, Kingston, Third. The College Record for Putting the Shot Was Broken.

It was decidedly fine weather at the Queen's athletic grounds Wednesday afternoon when the University students gathered to witness the college annual games. The attendance was not large, however, the several events did not fail to provide ideal entertainment for the onlooker who still takes delight in the contest where physical prowess is involved. Speaking generally it may be said that the results registered yesterday were decidedly disappointing. Surely there are men to be found at Queen's who can make the 100 yards in better than 11.5 seconds, the half mile in 2.20 and the mile in 5.31. It is not because the material is lacking at the university. The men who took part in yesterday's events are all capable of much better time. The reason they failed to lower records is that they do not train properly, and the reason they do not train properly is because they do not receive the proper encouragement.

Only one record received a jolt and at present it is uncertain whether the figures will stand. John Mackinnon put the sixteen pound shot 38 foot 10 1/2 inches. This is a departure as to the ground level. The record was 38 feet 2 inches. The individual championship again went to Duncan E. Foster, who was credited with eighteen points. John Mackinnon was a close second, with sixteen, while W. McCartney, the city lad, made a splendid showing with a count of twelve. The credits of the Royal Military College who were engaged in the 220, quarter, half, and mile events also the high jump carried off two firsts, four seconds and three thirds. The events were as follows: 100 yards—1, Foster; 2, McCartney; 3, Barnett; 4, Legg; 5, Trefrey. Time, 11.15 seconds.

A meeting of the tennis experts for the first intercollegiate tennis tournament was held when officers for the ensuing year were chosen. The talent displayed at the recent tourney was a great surprise, the players in nearly all cases being very evenly matched. This speaks well for the future of intercollegiate tennis, and it was decided to organize permanently at once. Next year the championships will be played off on the courts of the Royal Military College under the same conditions that governed the meet this year. Officers were chosen: Honorary president, Capt. Russell Brown; president, W. Dobson, Queen's; first vice-president, F. McEachern, Toronto; second vice-president, E. R. Pierce, McGill; secretary-treasurer, Mr. Rhodes, R.M.C.; executive, the secretaries of the four clubs.

MEMBERS HAD "SMOKER." A Pleasant Time at Court Stanley, C.O.F. The regular meeting of Court Stanley No. 109, C. O. F., on Wednesday evening, took the form of a smoker. There was a very large turnout of the members, and everyone had a most enjoyable time. A series of three progressive euchre parties are to be held by the members, and a fine time is expected to be had. The game was played last night until eleven o'clock, after which refreshments were served. The lodge is in a flourishing condition, and the members are looking forward to a great many new members being added during the winter.

HAD HIS ARM BROKEN. Son of Fireman Snider Met With Accident. Wilfrid, the young son of Fireman T. W. Snider, of the lower station, living in the West End, was the victim of an accident, Wednesday afternoon, and as a result had his right arm fractured. The lad had been sent by his mother for some gasoline to the oil sheds near the railway tracks, and while on the errand he had to wait for some time until the oil could be served. With a number of other lads he commenced to play on the roof of an old shed, and in jumping off the shed, a distance of about three feet, he slipped, and fell on his arm, with the result that the member was broken. He is doing as well as can be expected.

CAME FOR THREE YEARS. Was Found Guilty of Manslaughter at Windsor. The sheriff, at Windsor, arrived in the city, on Wednesday night, with Joseph Thompson, who was found guilty on a charge of manslaughter, and sentenced to three years in the penitentiary. Thompson struck a man named Chester Perkins in front of Perkins' liveries, at Windsor, in March last, and the blow caused Perkins' death. He was sentenced by Justice Sutherland.

PULPITS OCCUPIED BY TWO OLD COUNTRY EVANGELICAL REPRESENTATIVES. Archdeacon Madden Preached in St. George's Cathedral and Rev. Dr. Hanson in Queen Street Methodist Church Last Evening. Venerable Archdeacon Madden, of Liverpool, England, representing the Evangelical Alliance of Great Britain, preached to a fair-sized congregation, in St. George's cathedral, on Wednesday evening. The text chosen was from Revelation xxi, 13: "On the east three gates; on the west three gates; on the south three gates; on the north three gates."

TO MAKE SUGGESTIONS As to Improvements for School Grounds. Prof. Hutt, of the landscape gardening department of the Ontario Agricultural College, paid a visit to Victoria, Frontenac and Central schools, yesterday afternoon, in company with the property committee of the board of education, with the object of pointing out how the grounds might be beautified and thus have an educational value. He found that Kingston's school grounds were in shape to yield readily to beautification, and will report in writing his suggestions. In many places school boards are taking pride in adornments, and Prof. Hutt thinks Kingston has superior advantages over other cities. The atmosphere of Kingston suggests beauty, its buildings are unusually imposing and the natural elevations all tend to make up a place for picturesqueness and classic beauty. He admired the aesthetic, and his suggestion was a park commission to not only have charge of parks, but also of boulevards and street beautification. In some cities boulevards were mowed, watered and kept in shape at small expense, in Winnipeg at three cents per foot for maintenance. There was a uniformity about the lawns that added greatly to appearance. Prof. Hutt went east to Cornwall, this afternoon.

KINGSTON PRESBYTERY. Resignation of Rev. T. J. Glover Was Accepted. There was a special meeting of the Kingston Presbytery, Wednesday night with Rev. J. E. Smith, of Burnbrae, in the chair. The resignation of Rev. T. J. Glover, of the Church of the Redeemer, at Deseronto, who received a call to the Algoma district, was accepted. T. J. Donnelly and J. L. McFarlane, of Deseronto, represented the congregation at the Church of the Redeemer. Rev. A. H. Drum, of Belleville, was appointed moderator of the session, during the vacancy. S. Russell, of Belleville and Rev. J. A. Shaver, of Deseronto, were appointed a committee of supply, to act with Mr. Drum. Rev. A. Thompson, of Newburgh, was appointed moderator of the session of November.
