TO HELP THE POOR

WILL GIVE UP FARM FOR LIFE ANNUITY.

Corwaller Makes Unique Offer Towards Establishing County Home of Refuge.

Corwall, Oct. 25.—The county House of Refuge problem which has been perplexing the members of the county council of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry for six years past, has been practically settled by the courteous acceptance of the offer of W. A. Craig, who gives his 140-acre farm, valued at \$13,000 and \$7,000 cash to complete the project, in consideration of an annuity of \$1,200 or six per cent. interest on the donation during the lifetime of Mr. and Mrs. Craig, or in any case not more than twenty years. Mr. Craig's farm is just north of the G.T.R. depot at Corwall, convenient to the town's electric light, gas and water supply. This question has been before the county council more or less for half a dozen years, and finally last July, in consequence of a threat of a mandamus by certain parties, the counties appointed a special committee to deal with the question with the above result.

CAPE VINCENT MOURNS

The Death of Frank N. Potter, a Leading Townsman.

Cape Vincent, N.Y., Oct. 24.—This village has sustained a heavy loss by the death of Frank N. Potter, a life-long resident and one of the prominent citizens. He had been seriously ill for several weeks, but his friends, who included practically the entire community, were none the less shocked by the fatal termination. Mr. Potter was sixty years of age, and through nearly the whole of his adult life followed a business career. For the greater part of the time he was travelling salesman or commission agent of well-known business establishments in New York, Syracuse, Utica and other cities, and his service in those capacities brought him into intimate association with many of the leading tradesmen of Northern and Central New York. Among them all he was held in affectionate esteem, for his invariable courtesy, his scrupulous integrity, his high sense of honor, and his fine qualities of heart and mind. It was the often-expressed verdict of his business and social acquaintances that his word was as good as his bond. In politics he was a loyal and earnest member of the temperance party. Soon after Grover Cleveland's second election to the presidency, in 1892, Mr. Potter was recommended by his fellow-townsmen of this village, as an eminent available candidate for the important office of collector of the port of Cape Vincent. It was one of the most desirable appointments within the jurisdiction of the port of Cape Vincent, and there were several rival claimants for the executive favor. His choice finally fell upon Mr. Potter, and considering that the Cape Vincent candidate had never held a political office and had never been aggressive or obtrusively active in politics, the selection was a high tribute to his character and standing among the citizens of Jefferson county. He discharged the duties of the office with his customary efficiency, fidelity and honesty, and to the satisfaction alike of the Cleveland administration and of all who had dealings with the collector. At the expiration of his term, in 1897, he resumed his business occupations. Mr. Potter was recognized as one of the most useful and public-spirited citizens of Cape Vincent. When the question of an adequate water supply came before that community, some years ago, he devoted his best energy and influence to the project and was conspicuously instrumental in carrying it to a successful culmination. With a man of his gentle and affectionate disposition, it was natural that his home life should be happy, and exemplary, and such can truthfully be said of it. Intensely devoted to his family, he was likewise as true as steel to the many friendships he formed through a valuable and busy life, and there is a special note of sincerity in the expressions of sorrow his death has elicited. Besides the bereaved widow, Mr. Potter is survived by three children, Frank G., now of Syracuse, and James N. and Anna, of Cape Vincent, and by one brother, Henry, of this village.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON WHO IN THE ROLE head of a family, or any other person over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion office in the nearest Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency on certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, wife, daughter or sister.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead, or a farm of at least 16 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section adjoining his homestead. Price, \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to save homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased section in certain districts. Price, \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$500.00.

A Fiddler's Velvet Crab.

For the first time on the east coast a rare but ferocious species known as fiddler's velvet crab has been taken at Yarmouth, where it was captured in a shrimpy net on Wednesday. It derives its name from the plushlike feel of its upper surface, which is densely covered with short silky hairs.
