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A BEGGAR ARRESTED

Hospital at Toronto was to have sent him to Gravenhurst—Seeking Help From Hotel Guests Late Tuesday Night—Was Remanded Week by the Magistrate. "Just give me half a minute to explain, judge. I am on the square all right. I am sick and cannot work. If I could, I would be able to get along all right."

A short, and rather stout little fellow, bobbed up in the prisoners' dock in police court, Wednesday, and made this plea. His name was given as Thomas Jackson, and the charge against him was that of begging. Constable Samuel Arnie arrested him late Tuesday night.

The accused said that he would not plead guilty to the charge. He said that he had been ill, was not able to work, and that he was trying to make some money by selling shoe laces. Evidently he carries on his business late at night, as it was 11:30 o'clock when he was taken in charge.

Continuing his story, Jackson said that he had been in the general hospital, at Toronto, for two weeks, and that the hospital authorities there had decided to send him to Gravenhurst for treatment. However, through some mishap, he did not get to Gravenhurst.

Constable Arnie told of the accused being put out of the hotel, and his arrest. When taken to the police station, he had some shoe laces in his pocket. W. Teller, proprietor of the British-American hotel, said that the accused had been in his hotel on two or three occasions, recently. On one occasion he had to put him out of the bar. At 11:30 on Tuesday night, the accused was in his hotel, presenting a paper to his guests, and begging money. He told him to take a walk. He did not see any shoe laces in the man's possession.

"But that's what I do," said the accused. "I present the card, and then sell the shoe laces." All the time he was telling his story he placed one hand to his side, composing of a pain. He wanted the magistrate to summon a doctor, in order that it might be shown that he was a very sick man. The magistrate, however, stated that he would remand him for a week, and that he would then have a chance to see a doctor. The accused admitted having been in all the towns between Toronto and Kingston. The police will look up his story about being in the hospital in Toronto. Jackson admitted he had been drinking.

Joseph Valois, a marine man, was accused of being drunk. He admitted his guilt, and was very sorry. "I will quit the drink for good," he told the court. The magistrate pointed out that there was a comfortable place for the sailors to stay, while they were in the city, and that they had no occasion to be loafing around the hotels. However, he would give the accused a chance.
