

**QUITE LIVELY TIME**

**ON PRINCESS STREET ON THURSDAY EVENING.**

"B" Battery Man, Arrested on Charge Assault—Alleged He Struck a Citizen With a Whip—Case Was Opened and Adjudged in Police Court.

A good stout whip, almost broken in half, was laid on the lawless table, at police court, Friday morning. It had all importance in a case, heard by Magistrate Farrell. A member of "B" battery, was charged with having, on Thursday evening, on Princess street, assaulted and hit with a whip a young man, employed as a city driver. The latter claimed that the soldier struck him with the whip, and his right eye, which was in deep mourning, and covered over with a bandage, showed that he had been in a mood of some kind. The accused was placed under arrest by Constable "Harry" Filson, after a most exciting chase. In police court, J. Mell Mowat appeared on behalf of the complainant, and Capt. Roy represented the accused, who pleaded "not guilty." The accused told his story, under oath, but the case was adjourned until Wednesday next, in order that other witnesses might be summoned.

In his evidence he said that he came down Princess street with another person. The two stood for a while, and as they did so, a couple of soldiers passed by and witness passed the remark that the soldier "carried his jug very well." At this, he said, the defendant came up to him and took objection. Witness told him that he was not talking to him, and told him to go about his business. Witness then moved along the street, to the corner of Montreal and Princess street, and defendant followed, and struck him with the whip. Witness clinched with the soldier, and then another soldier struck him. As the result of the injuries he received from the blow given by the whip, he had to be attended by a doctor, who put some stitches in his face. Witness identified the whip, produced in court, as one similar to that which had been used on him. He knew the man who had struck him, as he had clinched with him.

Capt. Roy questioned the complainant about who was with him on the street, and when the name was given, told the court that it was quite important that the complainant's companion, and also a couple of other soldiers should be present to give evidence. On this account, the magistrate adjourned the case, and the accused was allowed out, the military authorities to be responsible for his appearance when the case is called. An escort arrived from the barracks, and escorted him to his quarters.

It appears, from all accounts of the affair, that there was very a lively time on Princess street, after the row occurred. A large crowd gathered, and it is stated that when they saw that the citizen had been assaulted they gave chase to the soldier. The accused made a retreat, running to Bagot street, and then to Queen street. Constable Filson was in a store on Bagot street when he heard a crowd running past, shouting "catch that man." Constable Filson immediately got busy when he heard that it was alleged that the soldier had assaulted a man, and he rushed in, and saw the accused near the corner of Bagot and Queen streets.

**QUESTION OF GOOD FOOD**

Discussed by Prof. Knight Before Alumni Conference.

Prof. A. P. Knight gave his concluding lecture before the Theological Alumni association of Queen's university on Friday morning in connection with the course on "The Conservation of Life." His subject was "Food." There is great need of public instruction, he pointed out, in the matter of saving life, and the death rate in Ontario among infants, in 1907, is a proof that attention to the food supply is necessary. At least 2,000 infants could be saved annually if parents were only sufficiently intelligent or sufficiently trained to care properly for their offspring. Out of 23,584 babies born in 1907 no fewer than 3,011 died before they were a year old. In that year there were only fifty-five deaths due to alcoholism. If temperance organizations would devote some time to this subject it would be a good thing. It is also time that the government of Ontario should devote time and energy to caring for human life, it does to the rearing of pigs and cattle for market.

Prof. Knight pointed out that all the influences affecting human life food is the most important. Good food, if properly cooked, has more to do with promoting health and strength in growing boys and girls than any other influence. Pure air, sunshine, adequate rest, sleep and exercise are important, but good food stands first. The lecturer laid stress upon the necessity of people eating proper food. Many farmers live on a monotonous diet and their vitality is impaired. Other people overeat, and do not take enough exercise. Prof. Knight, in discussing the question, asked whether man was designed to eat a meat diet or not, pointed out that judging from the formation and shape of man's teeth it was evident that God meant him to use both animal and vegetable foods.

**Old Portsmouth Resident Dead.**

The death occurred at two o'clock, Friday morning, at her home in Portsmouth, of Mrs. Cameron, widow of the late Alexander Cameron, a well-known Portsmouth contractor, who died ten years ago. The deceased was born in Scotland eighty-six years ago, and had lived in Portsmouth nearly three-score years. For some years past, her niece, Miss Isabel McEae, resided with her. Mrs. Cameron was a member of the Portsmouth Presbyterian church, but for many years was connected with Cook's church.

**Refused Entry to Horse.**

This afternoon, Dr. G. W. Bell, government veterinary inspector for this district, refused to allow a Water-town horse to enter at this port. The animal is thirty-six years of age, and was brought across by a farmer, who has some property back of this city. The inspector did not think that the animal was fit. People across the line are beginning to realize that Canada is just as particular as the United States regarding the character of people and animals who seek entry here.

**WORK IS RETARDED**

**ON THE STREETS BY THE WET WEATHER.**

Corporation Men Have Worked Only Two Days This Week—An Answer Being Awaited From the Hydro-Electric Commission—The Road Paving Question.

During the past week, the Corporation laborers have been able to work only two days on walk and road building. Out of six days, four have been rainy and unfit for outside work. Hence the completion of the Princess-street roadway and of the grades on that street has been delayed. It will probably be another week before the work is finished. There are two more concrete walks in Frontenac ward to be constructed, and it is doubtful if a start will be made before next Tuesday, as Monday is a holiday.

This year fully forty-five grades have been added to the streets, eight of which are on Princess street. The streets can stand a good many more. Before the road drainage will be what it should be, fully 100 extra grades will be required. Each year a number is being added.

**Question of Cheap Power.**

The light, heat and power committee hopes to come to some conclusion at its meeting on Tuesday next regarding the Seymour company's power offer. It is hoped to have a reply from the Hydro-Electric Power Commission as to the price at which it would supply power to Kingston.

**What Lucky Block Is This?**

The board of works will, next week, have before it a report of the city engineer as to the report he has met in his canvass of three blocks for signatures for road paving. It is known that enough signatures have been secured on one block to permit the city council to order the block paved. It is a question whether enough signatures of property owners on the other two blocks will be secured. It is necessary to get two-thirds of the owners to sign.

**Died at Portsmouth.**

Mrs. Turner, wife of Thomas Turner, Portsmouth, died on Thursday from decline, after an illness of three years, which she bore with patience and resignation. Deceased, aged fifty-two years, was a daughter of the late Sylvester McKinley, of Parham. She had been married over thirty years and lived, until a year ago, at Picton. She is survived by an husband, three daughters and one son. A tender, gentle mother, she was beloved by all who knew her. She was a member of the Methodist church.
