## IN "HOLD-UP" GAME NOT QUITE SO YOUNG

ALLEGED THAT COUPLE ATTEMPTED IT. AS HE USED TO BE IN LAST CENTURY.

But That it Did Not Pan Out Way It Was Intended—Claimed Wife Had Been Insulted and Threatened an Arrest.

Yesterday afternoon Frank Bennett and his wife, arrested on a charge of vagrancy, were removed to the county jail, on the week's remand, given them by Magistrate Farrell. The story they told will be investigated, but it was stated last night that there was no doubt but that the couple would be deported, that is, of course, providing that there is no additional charge against them.

Although they were only charged with being vagrants, it is alleged that evidence could be secured to show that the two were engaged in a very bold "hold-up" game, one which has been played for many years, but which has often been nipped in the bud.

It is alleged that on Saturday night the two were at the Kingston & Pembroke railway station. The husband left his wife in the waiting room, a few minutes, and it is alleged that when he came back into the waiting room, and found a young man in conversation with his wife, there were wigs on the green.

"That's my wife, and I will have you arrested," the husband is alleged to have said.

But the fellow was not to be 'stung.' He appeared to be ready for such an accusation.

"You can go and get a policeman if you like," he replied, and at the same time walked away. It so happened that a police constable did arrive on the scene a few minutes later. The husband claimed that his wife had been insulted by a young man who came up to her in the station and opened up a conversation, but he did not care to press the charge, and the matter dropped.

The fact that the couple were arrested on a charge of vagrancy, to which they pleaded guilty, had led to the belief that the incident at the railway station was nothing more than a straight attempt at a "hold-up."

In the police court, on Wednesday, the couple stated that when they arrived in the city they secured a room at a house on Earl street.

WOULD BE UNSATISFACTORY.

To Pave Only One Block in Business Section.

This afternoon the city engineer will report to the board of works that he has secured sufficient signatures for paving only one block in the business section, that block being on Wellington street between Brook and Princess. It is considered that it would be very unsatisfactory to pave only one block on the conditions, and would be very unfavorable. As the adjacent blocks would not be paved this one would be always pretty muddy in wet weather and would draw adverse comment. Whether the board of works will decide to recommend to council that the block in question be paved next spring is not known, but it is not thought that the engineer would recommend it unless there was to be a larger amount of paving to be done.

The meetings are open to everyone.

Died at St. Thomas.

The death occurred at St. Thomas on Monday, of William Hall, B.A., who graduated at Queen's University last spring, and who, since then, held the position of chief clerk in the office of the divisional engineer in the Michigan Central railroad. The deceased was in his twenty-fourth year. He had been ill for over two months. His father, mother, and one sister survive.

An Austrian named Dabyllo Petshuck, employed at the Lehigh cement works, died Tuesday at Point Ann. Pneumonia was the cause. Deceased was forty-eight years of age.
