

DID HE SUICIDE?

VANISHED INTO THE BUSH WITH A PISTOL.

Mysterious Disappearance From Northern Lumber Camp of Man Who Hinted at Murder.

Port William, Nov. 3.—A few days after he had told his boyhood friend, W. C. Murphy, of the firm of Murphy and Adill, owners of a lumber camp north-west of here, for whom he was working, that he would willingly hang if he could kill three men who had lured him out a fortune, Charles Thompson, forty-six years of age, borrowed a revolver from the camp cook and disappeared in the dense forest. He is thought to have committed suicide.

News of the man's disappearance nearly two weeks ago was brought to the city by Mr. Murphy, who has since had his entire crew of men searching the surrounding country. Thompson had neither hat nor coat, and could scarcely have reached civilization, as he was without provisions. Murphy later learned that the man had threatened to commit suicide. Thompson was once a prosperous business man of Pembroke, Ont.

A Triumph in Surgery.

Toronto, Nov. 3.—When Norman Allen, Sutton, Ont., cut the main artery in his leg with a sharp chisel, some weeks ago, he lost so much blood that the doctors despaired of his life. His younger brother volunteered and surgeons decided to try the transfusion of blood, first of such operations in Canada. At the general hospital blood was pumped out of one brother into the other, and both have now recovered. They were presented to prominent surgeons of the United States and Canada as marvels of the triumph of modern surgery.

Bank Clerk's Shortage.

Watertown, N.Y., Nov. 3.—Officials of the National Bank are endeavoring to locate Carl H. Rohr, a bank clerk, who left the employ of the bank on October 24th to go west. The bank was consolidated yesterday with the National Bank and Loan company into the Northern New York Trust company, of which Vice-President Sherman is a director. In checking up the books a shortage of \$15,000 was found in those kept by Rohr. The Union bank made good the alleged defalcation.

Brigands Kidnap Girl.

Mexico City, Mexico, Nov. 3.—At the request of U. S. Consul Miller, rurales were started in pursuit of brigands who kidnaped Grace Rolph, the sixteen-year-old daughter of Dr. B. M. Rolph, of Pender, Neb., from a ranch near Chicoy, Tamaulipas. The desperadoes first riddled a safe in the ranch office and then fled, taking the American girl with them.

Peary and the Navy.

Washington, D.C., Nov. 3.—Captain Robert E. Peary, the Arctic explorer, returns to active duty in the United States navy department on November 15th, as engineer expert for the department of justice in cases before the court of claims involving construction work for the naval bureau of yards and docks.

Called to London Church.

London, Nov. 3.—The quarterly board of Askin street Methodist church has decided to issue a call to Rev. G. W. Henderson, Peterboro, to become their pastor next June, in succession to Rev. A. K. Birks, president of the London conference.

PROF. WATSON AT GLASGOW.

Delivering Lectures on "Interpretation of Religion."

The Glasgow Herald says that the Gifford lectures on natural theology have been continued this year in the University of Glasgow to Dr. John Watson, of the chair of moral philosophy, Queen's University, Kingston, Canada. Prof. Watson will deliver two courses of lectures, his subject being "The Interpretation of Religious Experiences." The Herald in referring to the first lecture of the first course, which was given in the humanity classroom of the university, says: "Principal Sir Donald MacAlister introduced Prof. Watson as one of the most distinguished of their alumni, and as one whose reputation as a philosopher in the dominion of Canada had long extended to this country."

"Prof. Watson expressed the pleasure he felt in finding himself back in his old university, after an absence of thirty-eight years. The main object of the lectures, he said, was to determine whether and how far a reconstruction of religious ideas might be necessary in view of the complexity of modern thought. An enquiry would first be made into the origin and development of Christianity, but in the course of that enquiry particular attention would be devoted to the theological interpretation of religion and especially to the influence upon it of philosophy."

Prof. Watson went on to show that religion was a life as well as a creed and a ritual. Religion did not consist in ceremonial and ritual, since a man who had no belief in the divine, and, therefore, no reverence for what might perform the so-called religious act of worship and yet be essentially irreligious. No man could be religious who had not a belief in the divine, but it did not follow that he was able to throw his belief into a systematic form, much less that he could present the rational grounds on which it rested. The lecturer went on to speak of the untenable position of regarding faith and reason as abstract opposites, and he argued that the relation between faith and reason could not be that of mutual exclusion; faith could differ from reason only in being an immediate or intuitive exercise of reason, while reason was simply explicit faith. Religious faith was not fixed ones for all, but grew and developed with the growth and development of experience as a whole.

COMPLAINED TO THE POLICE.

Stated That Men Were Stealing Hi Coal.

Very much excited a man walked into the police station Wednesday morning, and complained to the men that some people were making a rail on his coal bin and that he wanted the police to go and stop them.

"There are about forty men and a dozen or so rigs there," he exclaimed. "They are carrying away the coal as fast as they can."

From the way in which the man acted the police could see that he was not in his right mind and he was removed to his home as speedily as possible. On the way to his home he imagined all sorts of things and the constable who had him in charge had his hands full looking after him.

The unfortunate man, so it appears, has just suffered a severe illness and his story about the theft of his coal was all imagination. He was reported to be in better health to-day.

Horse Should Have Been Shot.

If the horse had appeared on Kingston streets, Immigration inspector Arnel would have taken possession of it before it had proceeded a hundred yards and had it shot.

A dissolution of partnership having taken place in the firm of Messrs. Laidlaw & Keitcheson, Belleville, the former is about to leave the city. On Saturday evening Mr. Laidlaw was the recipient, on behalf of the employees of the store, of a handsome travelling bag and address: John Laidlaw is a brother of D. G. Laidlaw, Kingston.
