A CHURCH SCANDAL

ANONYMOUS LETTERS ARE CIRCULATED.

Charges of Improprieties and Inconsistencies made Against Prominent Members of Dominion Methodist Church, Ottawa—A Woman Suspected.

Ottawa, Nov. 7.—The Congregation of Dominion Methodist church, have been greatly exercised during the past few weeks because of a series of anonymous letters sent by some woman, a member of the church, to various prominent church officials, making charges of improprieties and inconsistencies unbecoming to church members. One city merchant, for instance, was accused of paying too much attention to his stenographer. Other members were accused of flirting or of emphasizing social distinctions.

Finally a committee of members was appointed to investigate. A New York handwriting expert was called in, and suspicion is now fastened on the wife of a man who has held many important offices in the church. The letters are still continued, and it is stated that the matter may finally reach the police court.

HOW LAURIER FEELS.

Too Sore to Laugh, Too Big to Cry.

Ottawa, Nov. 7.—When asked for an expression of opinion on the Drummond bye-election, Sir Wilfrid Laurier said:

"The government has received a blow, of course, but it should not be exaggerated.

"I feel very much like Abraham Lincoln did on the occasion of just such a reverse. He was asked by a friend what he thought of it, just as you ask now. Lincoln replied: 'I feel like the little boy who hurt his toe, too sore to laugh, and too big to cry.'"

"The charge that Laurier has been hoist by his own petard is untrue. Laurier has never used his influence with French-Canadians against English-Canadians, or even done anything but try to prevent racial prejudice in Canada."

Burned at the Stake.

Rock Springs, Texas, Nov. 7.—Antonio Rodriguez, of Las Vatas, Mexico, thirty years old, was burned at the stake by a mob, following his confession that he shot and killed Mrs. L. Henderson, wife of a ranchman, because she "spoke mean" of him.

Several thousand persons stormed the jail just after midnight and carried Rodriguez to a prepared pyre. Without a show of emotion Rodriguez was bound to the stake.
