**PERJURY IN CASE**

REMARKS OF MAGISTRATE IN LIQUOR TRIAL.

If Guilty Parties Can be Found They Will be Punished to Fullest Extent of Law—Evidence Taken in Charge Against Lewis Martin—Adjourned Until Friday.

"Any person listening to the evidence in this case, cannot feel but that there has been perjury some way. We would not have had the statements made, unless some person or persons were perjuring themselves. I would like to find out more about the case, and if we can find that there has been perjury, the guilty party or parties will be punished to the fullest extent of the law. Any person listening to both sides, can see that both sides cannot be true, and that some person or persons are wilfully falsifying as regard what took place."

After making this statement, Magistrate Farrell adjourned a liquor case until Friday, in police court, to-day Lewis Martin, proprietor of the River house, corner of King and Queen streets, was accused of selling liquor on Sunday last. The case arose out of the evidence given on Monday was that a man named Corrigan and another, Charles Mann, a stranger in the city, swore that they had secured liquor at the hotel. C. R. Webster conducted the prosecution and D. A. Gibbons appeared for the defence, and a number of witnesses were called. Several witnesses were called, the case lasting from ten o'clock until nearly 1:30 o'clock.

Corrigan and Mann stuck to their story that the liquor was secured at the River house, and considerable of the evidence taken on Monday was gone over again Mann says that Corrigan got the liquor. He did not actually see the liquor handed out to Corrigan, but says he saw Corrigan go into the bar, with the proprietor, and when Corrigan came out the latter gave him a drink. Later on the two had drinks out of the bottle of whiskey.

Lewis Martin, proprietor of the hotel, denied the charge. He told of Corrigan calling at his place, and giving him \$1 for a bottle of whiskey, but he says that he refused to give it to him. He says that he would sell no liquor on Sunday. He would have to wait until Monday morning, if he wanted to be served.

The defence called three other witnesses, who claimed they were with Martin in the morning, and during the time, it was alleged that Mann, Corrigan and Mann called and made the request for liquor, and they corroborated the evidence of Mr. Martin, stating that they saw Corrigan offer the money and ask for liquor, Mr. Martin refusing to get the liquor for him.

The magistrate said that he wished further evidence, and three persons were mentioned. They will be summoned for Friday.

The Very Latest Culled From All Over the World.

At Brantford, Ald. Rastall has announced himself a majority candidate in the first in the field.

An express car on the Grand Trunk line from Toronto to Montreal was burned with all its contents.

Austen Chamberlain, speaking at Wigan, told his hearers that a tax of two shillings on corn would not bring dearer bread to market.

F. A. Acland, deputy minister of labor, has left for Atlantic City to recuperate after his accident in Toronto recently.

Joseph E. Thompson is mentioned in connection with the conservative nominations for the legislature in East Toronto.

Hal McGivern, M.P., Ottawa, will move the address in reply to the speech from the throne. Ernest Lapointe, M.P., Kanouraska, will second it.

George Flay, Toronto, twenty-two years old, was sentenced to three years and thirty lashes for indecent assault and for aggravated assault, stabbing and beating a woman.

An explosion of natural gas at the residence of Albert M. Bailey, Windsor, severely injured Mr. Bailey and J. H. Richards. The furniture of the room was destroyed.

Certain branch lines in New Brunswick, which the L.C.R. desire to acquire, will be reported on by E. W. Jordan, of the department of railways. He will report on the physical conditions.

The trial of Walter James Bell and John Gordon Jones, the alleged burglars who are suspected also of having murdered a Chinese laundryman at Torontoville, last summer, was adjourned this morning at Toronto.

At Hamilton, Ont., the grand jury, in the case of Thomas Finton, charged with the murder of his father, Elijah Finton, returned a true bill. On the application of his counsel Finton was remanded until the next sittings in January.

Bishop Fallon, London, addressing the annual meeting of the alumni of Assumption College, Sandwich, Ont., said: "I am determined that all the boys and young men in my diocese shall be enabled to receive an education which will fit them for success. A taxicab driven by Robert Morrison, an employee of the Verral Taxi company, Toronto, was caught between street cars, on Bloor street, and smashed almost beyond recognition. Two ladies passengers, escaped serious injuries, as did the driver.

S. Finkle, news agent arrested at Leaside on the charge of stealing \$350 from John Mattson, at North Bay, on Nov. 6th, pleaded guilty. He fined \$100 for selling liquor and allowed to go on suspended sentence on the theft charge on the understanding he would restore all money and pay costs.
