MUST HAVE NEW PIPE

TO REPLACE THE SECTION THAT IS LEAKING.

Superintendent Hewitt Says That the Old Section of 200 Feet Will no Longer be Satisfactory—Can't Make it Permanently Tight.

The work of repairing the leaks in the water works intake pipe is proceeding under the direction of Superintendent Hewitt. The two work done last week and on account of a much better job will now have to be done in order to render the pipe tight, and prevent more sewage entering it and contaminating the water supply. The leaky joint under the coal shed is in a difficult position but was, this morning, cleared of the mud about it so that an examination of its condition could be made. To a Whig representative to-day Superintendent Hewitt stated that the matter to do would be to replace the old section of about 200 feet of pipe with a new pipe. Until this was done conditions would not be satisfactory for it was a difficult thing to repair the two troublesome joints right for a long time. In meantime the old section of the pipe must be repaired but the committee would have to consider the matter of replacing it. Pipe can now be got in a much more convenient way than the present rigid section, which is covered with a good deal of old stone, etc., from the rebuilding of the coal shed.

What is bothering the superintendent, in case a new piece of pipe is laid, is with regard to temporary water supply. He is afraid that while the new pipe is in process of laying it would be necessary to pump the supply from the water and on account of sewage conditions the drinking of shore water for two or three days might cause sickness through the city. Here is where the auxiliary pump would be handy as in case of a breakdown of one pipe the other could be used. This question of an auxiliary pipe was discussed by the water works committee last winter but after the typhoid scare had abated the matter was forgotten.

Milk Case to be Tried. A well-known resident of the township of Kingston will tell Magistrate Hunter, at the court house, on Thursday morning, why the milk sent to Cataract cheese factory from her farm was deteriorated. The party has been convicted twice before on the same charge, and, as there are three charges preferred against her this time the chances are that it will go hard with her. G. H. Bensley, inspector of cheese factories and dairies, made a test of the morning's milk and found that there was about two per cent. or a trifle over of butter fat. At this time of the year there should be about four per cent. of butter fat. In the evening another test was made and it tested a trifle over four per cent. butter fat.

CHANGES MADE.

(Continued from Page 1.) Governors Elected. The following states also elected governors. Returns are by no means complete, and it is possible there may be revisions: Democratic Governors—Alabama, Emmet O'Neal; Nebraska, C. W. Aldrich; South Carolina, C. L. Blesse; Texas, O. B. Colquitt. Republican Governors—Idaho, J. H. Brady; Kansas, W. R. Stubbs; Minnesota, A. O. Eberhart; New Hampshire, R. P. Bass; North Dakota, C. A. Johnson.

Cannon Re-Elected. It is regarded as certain that the democrats have secured the control of the House of Representatives, gains being recorded in Connecticut, Kentucky, Maryland (1909), Massachusetts, New Hampshire, North Carolina, Missouri (three), Iowa (three), and Illinois (six). The republicans are credited with single gains in Pennsylvania and New York respectively. In some counties the democrats made a clean sweep. Among the notable results are the re-election of ex-Speaker Cannon in Illinois, and the defeat of Parsons, one of Roosevelt's right-hand men, in the thirteenth New York district, and of Grilk in Iowa, to speak for whom the ex-president had interposed his New York campaign. Though "Uncle Joe" has come back, the republicans will be saved the delicate task of appointing a new speaker.

A Great Sweep. New York, Nov. 9.—Fuller returns of yesterday's election show the democrats will have a majority of forty-four in the house as against a republican majority of forty-three in the late house. The standing of the parties in the new house will be: Democrats, 217; republicans, 173; socialists, 1.

John A. Dix's plurality over Henry C. B. Carnahan, the republican candidate, is 62,457. New York city goes Dix a plurality of about 100,000. The democracy of twenty-five in the assembly and a majority of three in the senate.

The election of Woodrow Wilson, as democratic governor of New Jersey, is assured, by a plurality of 15,000 to 20,000.

This morning's returns indicate the democrats will have a good majority in the legislature.

It is now believed Senator Beveridge has been re-elected, in Indiana, by a small majority.
