ANOTHER MILESTONE

PASSED IN HISTORY OF COOKE'S CHURCH.

Services on Sunday Marked Sixty-fourth Anniversary of Opening of Church—Rev. Dr. Elfresh Makes Strong Appeal for Sunday School Workers.

Cooke's church has passed another milestone today, marking the sixty-fourth anniversary of the opening of the church, and appropriate services were held to mark the event.

The speaker pointed out, in an interesting way, the importance of the Sunday school, and the great work it was doing. The many opportunities for service, in this line of work, were also referred to, and many interesting stories told of how people, who at first did not consider themselves capable of teaching in the Sunday school, had accomplished a great deal of good.

The speaker wished his hearers to think about what they could do in their leisure time, the time they had at their disposal, away from business, and to use as they saw fit. A story was told of a man, who started in as a common laborer, on the railroad, and who, in a remarkably short space of time, was general manager of the road, and the record of his success was in the fact that he had used his leisure time, to advantage. And there were a good many similar stories which could be told.

Dr. Gordon (Ralph Connor) in discussing the question, had stated, that the Sunday school was looked upon as the last defence. Christianity was not being taught in the home, as it should be, and the opportunity of today, was in the Sunday school.

"If we are to have a Christian nation," declared the speaker, it all depends upon these schools, for it is in the last line of defence. There is a call to-day for men who will be leaders—men who will work in the Sunday school, and mould the minds of the children, so that we can build up a strong Christian nation."
