SENT TO CENTRAL

MAGISTRATE GIVES VAGRANT TERM SIX MONTHS.

Syracuse Couple Arrested Three Weeks Ago, Gave Wrong Names to the Police—Woman Was Further Remanded a Week—Chance for John Sullivan.

Six months in the Central prison. This was the sentence meted out, in police court, to-day, to the man who gave the name of Frank Bennett, arrested for vagrancy, three weeks ago, with a woman, who claimed to be his wife. The woman was further remanded for a week.

It appears that the parties gave the police their wrong name. The two have been on remand, in jail, and when the case was called, to-day, Magistrate Farrell sentenced the man to six months in the Central prison. When the woman was called, and questioned by the court, she said that her right name was Stewart, and not Bennett, and that the man's name was Edward Bradshaw. His home was in Gouverneur, N.Y., and her home was in New Syracuse. It will be remembered that the police made an investigation of the case, and found that the story told by the accused, when they were placed under arrest, about being married, was all a fake. Now, to-day, it was found that they had even given the wrong names.

The magistrate told the woman that if she was inclined to tell the truth, he would deal leniently with her. She said she would be willing to give all the information desired, and further investigation will be made into her case. It is likely that papers will be secured, and that she will be deported.

John Sullivan, who was arrested on a charge of theft, at Abernethy's shoe store, was found guilty, and allowed to go on suspended sentence. The accused said at drink was the cause of all his trouble, when he was drinking, he did not know what he was doing. If given the chance he would take the pledge, and he was sure the police would have no objection to lock him up again.

The magistrate said that he would give him the chance, but if he ever came before the court again he need not expect to be leniently dealt with.

George Vanas was not only registered as a drunk, but was also accused of being disorderly. At 11:15 o'clock Vanas was on King street, near the Chinese restaurant, and was endeavoring to go through a war dance. Constable Arnie objected, on behalf of the people in the neighborhood, who were endeavoring to get a good night's rest. Vanas was taken to the police station, and was given time to "cool off." He did not deny the charge. Three dollars and costs of fifteen days.
