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PULLMAN CAR RATES.

In the admission by the Pullman Car company that cheaper rates can be had for sleepers, and that the Interstate Commerce Commission has the right to regulate the rates, there is hope for the man who climbs into the upper berth and the woman who struggles with the curtain on the lower one. There is a strong hint also for the Dominion railway commissioner, and no doubt, Chairman Wabebe will discover that regulation is quite as feasible in Canada as in the United States. Perhaps the sleeping and parlor car companies may discover, suggests the Toronto World, that intervention by the board is unnecessary, and that the public is entitled to some of the dividends that now go to fatten unduly favored shareholders.

THE CITY'S WATER SUPPLY.

The water works committee has made a wise but none too early move in deciding upon the replacing of the intake section of the intake pipe, which has proven faulty and beyond repair. If this section of pipe is allowed to remain the chances are that it will again give trouble. It will cost \$2,000 to replace it with pipe that will give satisfaction. This year it has already cost about \$1,500 to make repairs to two leaky joints, so it is clearly evident that, besides providing uncontaminated drinking water, the expenditure will be a good financial investment. Kingston has had the reputation of having the best water supply in the province. Only on three occasions in twenty years has the supply been found contaminated, and on each occasion it was caused by accidents to the intake pipe. About seven years ago there was a typhoid epidemic, due to the water, as it was found that the pipe had been injured by the anchor of a vessel catching on it. Twice this year two leaky joints inshore allowed sewage to enter the pipe and a number of typhoid cases resulted. It is satisfactory to know that the contamination has occurred from inshore water, in which sewage empties, and that the source of the water supply, at the mouth of the intake pipe, is not responsible. If the matter were decided definitely, serious. Prof. Knight, of Queen's, recently declared his belief that there was a grave danger of the water hereabouts all being contaminated by sewage, and that the Kingston supply was likely to be affected owing to the increased amount of sewage that is entering the harbor, and being whirled about by the currents. The day may come when Kingston will have to cease emptying its sewage into the harbor, and to provide other means for its disposal.

EDITORIAL NOTES.

The surest way to lessen the liquor traffic is to make the individual realize the evils of drinking and become a total abstainer.

The Chicago News remarks that by calling attention to the right way to run trials, Dr. Crippen, painful though his fate may be, is furthering an excellent cause.

THE DOMINION SURPLUS.

Canadians are enjoying prosperity. The postmaster-general hinted the other day that the surplus of the Dominion for the present year will likely run to the enormous sum of \$30,000,000. If so, it will be by many millions the largest favorable balance in the history of the country. The largest to date was that of 1908, which exceeded nineteen millions. The balance for the present year may fall several millions under the estimate and still be considerably in advance of all predecessors. The commercial significance of the prospective surplus can be judged when it is remembered that from consideration down to the close of 1908 the total surplus of all the years amounted to less than forty millions, and that if the deficits which occurred in some years are deducted from this net amount for the twenty-eight years is two millions less than that expected for the present year. As the bulk of the receipts come from the tariff, the revenue reflects in a pretty accurate way the trade conditions of the country. Last year, when the stringency which had prevailed during the preceding couple of years made itself apparent in the returns, the receipts exceeded the outlay by only something more than one million. That it is, this year, expected to be thirty times that amount without any change in the tariff schedule, indicates very plainly, says the Edmonton Bulletin, that the country has recovered from the effects of the depression and has taken a long stride forward of what might have been expected to be the normal expansion for the year.

HAMMER POINT HOME.

As time goes on, and the truth that Canadian naval defence as a sequel of British naval abandonment of our coast is a national necessity, just as the withdrawal of the regular troops from British North America compelled Canada to prepare for land defence, is

being pressed upon the people, so public opinion is coming to the conclusion that the Canadian navy is just as much a necessity as a Canadian militia.

It is a fact, which must be faced, says the Ottawa Free Press, that conditions have materially changed since 1902, and even since 1907. Then there were British fleets upon both our coasts; now there are none. And it should be the duty of politicians, both in public meetings and in private converse with their electors, to drive this very important point straight home.

That it requires merely to be stated to be acknowledged is proven by a remarkably trenchant editorial in the conservative Montreal Gazette, which thus acknowledges the responsibility which devolves upon Canada to defend herself, now that Great Britain has withdrawn her fleets. After describing the manner in which the British troops were taken away from Canada and in which Canada was compelled to take charge of the army stations, the Gazette goes on to say:

"A reorganization of the naval system came in due course. It was decided to concentrate the fleets in European waters, and abandon local dockyards which were not to be longer required. So the British navy, as well as the army, ceased to be permanently represented in the east of Canada. Now they have gone also from the west. The process was evolutionary and natural. It has worked to save money for Great Britain and has placed Canada to be self-reliant. Canadian residents do what little military service the conditions of the country require and have the militia behind them. Non-Canadian paid it not Canadian manned ships will replace British vessels for such naval service as is deemed necessary. The process of change is complete."

In this note, the liberal case in a nutshell for Canada needs naval defence as well as land defence and the institution of a Canadian navy is as much a national necessity as was the establishment of the permanent militia force after the withdrawal of the British troops. The Gazette realizes the truth. Will the leaders of the party with which it is affiliated do so also? But whether they do or not, there is the point which the liberals of Canada have got to hammer home at every opportunity, and in doing so this comment of the Montreal Gazette will help some.

IF WAR BREAKS OUT

JAPAN BOUND TO WHIP UNITED STATES.

Son of H. H. Rogers, Oil Magnate. Thinks War Will Come Before Panama Canal Opens.

New York, Nov. 16.—Considerable comment was heard in military circles over the statement made by H. H. Rogers, son of the late Standard Oil magnate, H. H. Rogers, that Japan will provoke a war with and whip the United States before the opening of the Panama canal.

Rogers, a captain of the National Guard, has been in Europe studying military conditions. He said all foreign officers believed war with Japan was sure to come, and that the United States would be badly beaten. Europe, he said, had a high regard for the navy, but regarded our army as a joke.

"What we need," said Rogers, "is compulsory military service, forcing young men to serve three years. He is a poor American, indeed, who is not willing to give us three years to safeguard his own country."

The ladies had full charge of the spread, and it was, indeed, a splendid one. The ladies of Cooke's church have always been noted for their ability in this line, and, on Tuesday evening, they excelled themselves.

After the supper there was a choice programme, introduced by the pastor, Rev. Dr. MacTavish. The different numbers were given with fine effect, and much appreciated by the audience. The programme included organ solos by Miss L. Walker and Arthur Cogswell; readings by Miss Maud Dunlop and James Dunlop; solos by Mrs. J. Smith, Madame Cochran and Albert Lenton; duets by the Misses Rose; selections from a quartette, composed of Messrs. Campbell, Semerville, Glover and Mathison, and violin solos by Miss Jean Johnston.

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
