## STILL AN EXODUS

DECLARES RURAL ONTARIO SUFFERS FROM DECLINE

In Twenty Years Population Decreased 80,000—Gordon Waldron Says Tariff is Largely to Blame

"A rural decrease of 80,000 in twenty years, after an exhausting drain during the previous thirty years, a rural birthrate scarcely exceeding the death rate, an urban increase of 200,000—that is a condition for which every consideration of patriotism and sound national life demands an immediate remedy," said Gordon Waldron, barrister and political economist, in addressing the Canadian Club, Toronto, on the depopulation and impoverishment of rural Ontario.

"It is 87 years," Canada's growing time, Canada's century. We are, we boast, annexing the United States. Yet, painful as it is to disturb a pleasant delusion, it must be said that there is still an exodus so large that without a corresponding immigration into the North-West, we could not possibly long survive," said Mr. Waldron. "On turning to the public reports, I find that notwithstanding all our confidances and buoyancies seventy thousand persons left Canada last year to seek their fortunes in the United States. Whether that exodus went from, I may venture to say in the presence of manufacturers unable to fill their orders from the west for lack of labor that it did not go from the cities and towns of Ontario. It was an exodus from the land—an exodus of farmers."

"But let me confine myself to rural Ontario. There, the evidence of depopulation and impoverishment is so plain that I am sure that you have all noted it. Neglected buildings and fences, neglected orchards, ill-cultivated land, land turned to pasture and in effect abandoned, the disappearance of the farm laborers and their dwellings, the fall in land values, and the very significant fact that farm production has not appreciably responded to an extended period of high prices."

"The quoted birthrate statistics to show that in rural districts the birthrate had fallen to 14 in the thousand and lower, while rural schools, which thirty years ago had 50 to 75 pupils, now had but a mere handful. To prove the movement of the population, he gave figures to show that in 1872 the rural population of Perth was 31,000; it is now 20,000. In the same year the rural population of Norfolk was 25,000; it is now 19,000. In 1872 the rural population of Huron was 50,257; it is now 35,267, a loss of nearly 14,000. In 81 rural Middlesex numbered 53,000; it is now less than 40,000. And they had not gone to the cities."

"What are the economic causes? The principal ones are protection and the withdrawal of the farmer from the market of the United States," said Mr. Waldron.

"Relief is to be found in tariff reform, in admission to the markets of the United States and in a reduction of the federal expenditure. Such is the only remedy offered by our friends who call themselves imperialists. It is preference in the British markets. Of that I do not venture to speak, lest I lose my reputation for temperate and cautious speech. Such is it to say that I regard the tariff reform movement in England as at heart a movement for agricultural protection, and I am convinced that agricultural protection once enthroned in England will prove itself quite as destructive to Ontario or Canadian agriculture as the industrial protection of the United States or Toronto."

## COAL FOR G.T.P. RR.

VALUABLE DISCOVERIES REPORTED WEST OF EDMONTON.

Will Make a Big Difference in the Operating Expenses of the Railway if the Mineral is Fit for Steam Use—The Brazeau Field.

Ottawa, Nov. 16.—A report by D. B. Dowling of the Dominion geological survey of the past season's work along the line of the G.T.P. east of Edmonton shows that coal deposits of considerable area and of good quality have been found along the route of the railway 200 miles west of Edmonton. One deposit is in the neighborhood of Jasper Park, and the other is situated near Brazeau Lake. The establishment of the fact that coal exists along the line of the G.T.P. is of the utmost importance to the railway. There is very little coal between the latest finds and the western coast, and to the east there are no deposits, except for what is known as "domestic" coal, which is unfit for use in engines. At present the railway pays about \$10 per ton for its fuel, whereas it would not cost more than about \$2 should the local deposits be utilized. Of these, by far the largest is what is known as the Brazeau field, which the G.T.P. will probably tap with a spur line.

## CONFINED IN CAGE.

Brother Was Insane—Greek's Dread of Hospitals.

Fort Wayne, Ind., Nov. 16.—Held secretly a prisoner by his brother, for the reason that he was demented, the police found Louis Charles, a Greek, locked up in a rude cage made from a packing case in a little upstairs back room in the heart of a business district. The unfortunate man had been confined for the last ten days guarded by padlocks and haps. The man was violent, and his hiding place was so remote that the police found their way to it with difficulty, even when the man's demoniacal cries attracted attention from the street. The brother had been feeding him and otherwise caring for the patient, but did not allow the fact to become known because he did not wish his brother placed in an hospital. The brother had built the cage and compelled the insane man to enter it.

## DOCTOR WAS SARCASTIC.

Thaw Not Compelled to Associate With Intellectual Inferiors.

Albany, Nov. 16.—Attorney-General O'Malley filed in the court of appeals affidavits in opposition to the appeal of Mrs. Mary C. Thaw in her application for the transfer of her son, Henry H. Thaw, who killed Stanford White, from Mattewan state hospital to some other asylum within the state. Among the affidavits prepared by Deputy Attorney-General Franklin Kennedy, who is in charge of the case, is one by Dr. Amos T. Baker, the first assistant physician at Mattewan.

In support of his contention that Thaw's surroundings are conducive to health, Dr. Baker alleges that since Thaw was committed to Mattewan he has gained thirty-seven pounds in weight, is permitted to play cards with congenial companions, to receive visitors, take outdoor exercise, read the best of literature, and is not compelled to associate with anyone who is not his equal intellectually and morally.

One of Mrs. Thaw's contentions is that her son is compelled to associate with patients who use vile language in his presence, and who often assault him. Dr. Baker says that these assertions are wholly unfounded, and that, on the contrary, the record of Thaw's past life, as brought out in the courts, would indicate that some of the patients might have good reason to object to associating with him.
