KERR THE WINNER

OF THE Y.M.C.A. FIVE MILE ROAD
RACE.

He Did the Distance in 31 52 1-5—
The Condition of the Roads Un-
favorable — Adams Finished a
Close Second.

Before a fair-sized crowd, the postponed five-mile city championship road race, under the direction of the Y.M.C.A. physical committee, was pulled off on Saturday afternoon without a hitch. A great many persons were looking to see the record broken, but the snow fall of Friday made the track very slippery, and the runners did not make as good time as they did Thanksgiving day. Kerr, the hardy Queen's man, took first honors, winning the race in 31.52 1-5, failing to come up to the time set by Adams at the last race of 31.5. Adams finished second in 32.10, six-tenths of a second behind the time in which he won on Thanksgiving day. Mellett and Ackroyd, of Queen's, were tied for third place, both going over the tape in 32.20. Steele, of Parham, who has run here several times, came in 32.35, and Wagner, of the Y.M.C.A., in 32.40. James, of Queen's, acted as starter, and Dr. Anglin and R. J. Hodder, of the firm of Rodger & Wright, noted as time-keepers.

There were sixteen entries and all finished the race. Kerr took the lead from the start and kept it all the way through, never allowing anyone to come within a dangerous distance. He ran very hard for the condition of the track, and finished in splendid condition. Several were disappointed in the way Adams finished. A few days before the race, he lowered his own time for the five miles and made the distance in less than thirty minutes. However, the roads were in a different condition on Saturday. Any blunders like the one which marred the last race was avoided by placing men at all the turning points to prevent anyone from making a mistake.

After the race Kerr, the winner, was presented with his trophy, the handsome silver cup, which was donated by R. J. Rodger. The officials of the race wish to thank Charles S. Anglin for the use of his automobile which he generously offered for the use of the officials.

The race was being run off, a number of sporting men were talking in the parlors of the Y.M.C.A. concerning the race, number of years ago and at the present. "I remember the time," said a man who is well-known in sporting circles, "when there were no cups put up for competition in race of this kind. When I was a young man I did a great deal of running, and the most I ever received from a five-mile race was fifty cents. I remember one time, many years ago, I went up to Deseronto and helped drive a herd of cattle from there to the city, a distance of thirty-six miles. That night, after reaching town, I ran five miles against a man named Smith at the Driving park hotel, for thirty-five cents. I raced against Smith probably a hundred times, and never succeeded in beating him once. He afterwards went up to Toronto and cleaned up everything there. I remember once putting up fifty cents against thirty-three cents belonging to another fellow, all the money he had, and we raced. I won. We raced for the fun of the thing, not for cups and medals."
