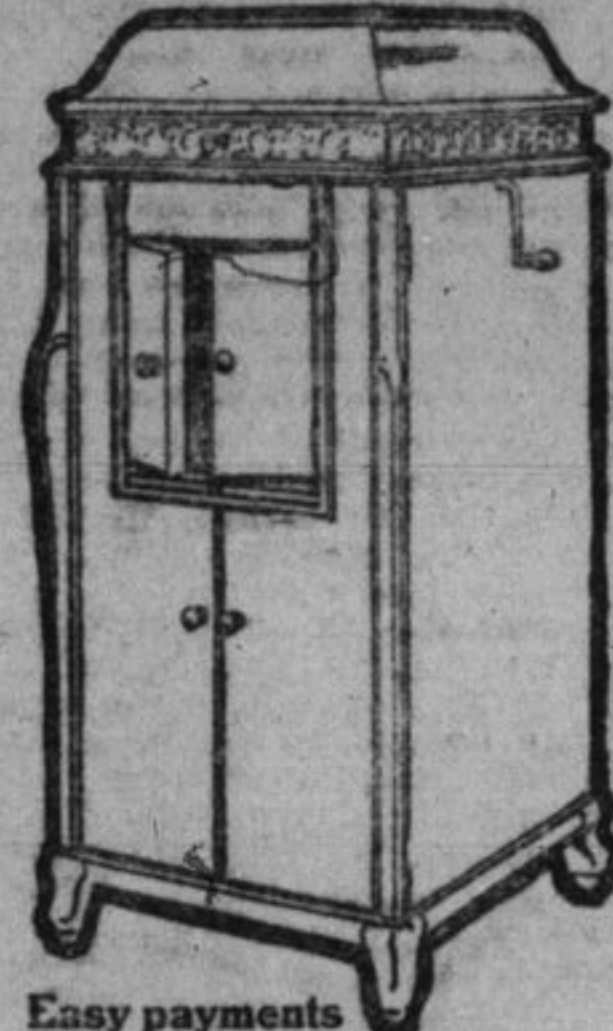

The Very Latest Culled From All Over the World.

The business of smuggling Chinamen across the border is again assuming big proportions.

One man was shot and four others bruised and cut in a riot of striking garment workers at Chicago.

A store has been looted and burned at Toluque, an isolated town near the Rio Grande, south of Alpine, Texas.

It is believed that a marauding band of Mexicans is operating along the Rio Grande preying on ranchers on both sides.

After all, the order for Japan's big warship goes to England. She will be of nearly 28,000 tons, and will cost about \$12,250,000.

Four men were killed by the premature explosion of a five-inch fifty-one calibre gun at the proving grounds of the navy, Washington.

C. A. Belling, of the Bronx National Bank, admits stealing \$50,000, and is ready to stand trial. He took it in hope of making a fortune.

The department of justice has been asked to use its influence to prevent the extradition to Russia of Savar Fedorenko, who is wanted there.

Unusually friendly personal relations exist between King George and the German emperor, who maintain a regular correspondence with one another.

Because he could not find his wooden leg, the bedroom being full of smoke, David Fox, Gladwyn, Pa., had a narrow escape from burning to death.

James Conklin, Princeton, Ill., has filed a petition for divorce; his wife refuses to dress like other women and her style of attire causes him much embarrassment.

Morris Banks, twenty-five years old, a member of a prominent Todd county farmer, shot and killed his aunt, Mrs. Carney Sebree, while she was sitting in her buggy.

The Standard Oil company has been loaning money heavily in the last three months. They estimate that upward of \$50,000,000 has been loaned by the corporation in the open market on time.

The steamer Royal George has been released from quarantine and arrived at Montreal, the case of illness on board having been pronounced a mild case of cholera, by Dr. Adams, of Montreal.

Through mistake Queen Alexandra was held up by German officers, who insisted on examining her baggage. Finally, on learning who she was, Queen Alexandra was allowed to proceed without her baggage being overhauled.
